#### **Update on Future Developments in the Village**

Last year the Hinckley and Bosworth Borough Council published its Site Allocation proposals for future developments in the village. These were for 59 houses on land off Sherwood Road

and a development on the Convent site as a care home or commercial buildings. As part of the consultation process the Heritage Group along with many residents objected to these proposals and suggested that the 59 houses should be built on the Convent site.

In mid April the Council will be publishing an amended version of its original document. This will be available on the Council's website and hopefully will be publicised widely. There will then be a six week period for further comments by residents before the document goes for approval by the Borough Council. After this there will be no further opportunities to comment on the proposals.

The free home delivery service is run by registered library volunteers who visit the homes of housebound people of any age. Volunteers will visit you to discuss your choice of books or music before bringing them to you in the comfort of your own home. Friends or relatives can also collect books and other items on your behalf.

You can hire up to 24 books for free, or 12 CDs at any time for a small hire charge from a mobile or through the home library service.

#### **Development of the Recreation Field**

In November of last year a Parish Council Newsletter was delivered to all homes in the village giving the suggested plan for the Recreation Field. We asked for comments to be made and a very small number of people got in touch with some concerns. Overall the plan was received positively. Since then work has continued to consider all the four quotations for the main construction work of the paths and to eventually be able to award the contract to Breydon Contractors. On Monday 1st March work finally started.

Breydon Contractors have begun to clear the ditch on the northern boundary and to cut down some of the bushes and brambles. The ditch is to be piped along most of this boundary, a temporary stock fence installed and a new hedge of native species planted. This work has to be tackled before the birds start to nest and also before the start of the cricket season – so by the time you read this we hope that this part of the project will be well under way. We hope that as the hedge matures it will provide a haven for wild life – surprisingly no nest remnants have been found as the work has progressed.

It is planned to install the path as close to the field boundary as possible as it skirts the edge of the cricket ground and as the path progresses down to the bottom of the field it will curve away from the hedge to give space for the BMX humps close to the boundary. One of our keen young BMXers has given us some ideas for the profile of the humps which will be built from the soil excavated for the path foundations. At the bottom of the field space has been allocated for the 'Pod Swing' which is now ordered. During the time since the inception of the whole project some prices have increased so to make the best use of the grants and money available we have been looking at putting in some fitness / circuit training equipment alongside the swing. This would provide facilities for the young people and could be used by the sports clubs if they wished. Again young people have been involved in selecting this and it is hoped to make the final decision and begin installation over the next six weeks.

The Parish Council is grateful for the funding recently offered by the Charity of Thomas Barton for two seats and some new dog waste bins - which will help to enhance the area and extend its use for a wider range of the community. We hope that residents will be pleased with the final result which should fulfil many — if not

all – of the requests from the village gathered by the Park Committee consultation exercise. Of course while the work is progressing it is inevitable that it will look somewhat messy! But please be patient with us and if you haven't been down to the Rec recently pop down and have a look at what's going on and encourage Darren Shorthose and his team.

#### Site of Bosworth Battlefield Found

Archaeologists pinpoint long-disputed site of Battle of Bosworth

'Experts confirm spot three kilometres from the current visitor centre where Richard III became the last English king to die in battle.'

These were the headlines in local, national and international papers. Stoke Golding is well and truly on the map

Archaeologists have at last announced that they have located not just the site of the Battle of Bosworth, but the spot where – on 22 August 1485 – Richard III became the last English king to die in battle when he was cut down by Tudor swords.

Nearby, Henry Tudor was crowned Henry VII, with the crown which had tumbled from the dying Richard's head. The crucial evidence, including badges of the supporters of both kings, sword mounts, coins and 28 cannonballs, was found in fields straddling Fenn Lanes in the Leicestershire Parish of Upton, where no historian had looked before. The haul adds up to more than the total found on all other medieval battle sites in Europe. The site was located by archaeologists using metal detectors across hundreds of acres, and poring over the evidence of medieval place names to match them to accounts of the battle.

Farmer Alf Oliver was astonished at the discovery in his fields three kilometres south-west of the visitor centre on Ambion Hill. One of the crucial finds, the largest of the cannonballs nicknamed "the holy grapefruit" by the archaeologists, was found just behind one of Oliver's barns. Another key discovery was a silver boar

no bigger than a thumbnail, battered but still snarling in rage after 500 years. It was found on the edge of a field still called Fen Hole, which in medieval times was a marsh that played a crucial role in the battle, protecting the flank of Henry Tudor's much smaller army. The marsh was drained centuries ago, but Mr Oliver said it still gets



boggy in very wet summers. "The fact that this little boar is Richard's personal emblem, and made in silver gilt, means that it can only have been given to one of the closest members of his retinue. The man who wore this would have fought and died at Richard's side

Other finds include a gold ring twisted like a pretzel, and an inch of gilded sword mount from a weapon of such high status that it can only have belonged to one of the aristocrats who led the battle forces.

Mr Glen Foard of the Battlefield Trust believes a more likely site now for the battlefield coronation is Crown Hill, a hillock within easy view of the newly identified site.

So it looks as if the old tradition of the village Coronation of Henry VII is true and the villagers really did climb the church battlements to watch Richard die and Henry become the victor. All of which was described in detail in the Charity of Thomas Barton leaflets which were published to commemorate the millennium and are still available in our Parish Church of St Margaret.

#### Garbrodfelde 1470 to Crown Hill 1605

'Now is the winter of our discontent Made glorious summer by this sun of York' So Richard Holmes stirringly introduced the conference at County Hall on 20<sup>th</sup> February 2010.

I, together with some 200 other people, had attended to hear some of the detail of the research project which has produced major advances in our understanding of the Battle of Bosworth. We all know <u>now</u> that the real site of the Battle of Bosworth is two miles southwest of the place currently visited by thousands every year

On August 22nd 1485, King Richard made a last desperate charge near the Fenn Lanes in an attempt to kill Henry Tudor. This was the climax of the battle – quite simply a brutal struggle for power between two men and their supporters. Kill or be killed. Richard and his retinue were driven back into a marshy area to die. This was where one of his retinue lost the silver gilt badge of a boar, a personal ensign only given by Richard to his knights, and a major find of this project.

Sources as to what happened the day of the battle are few and far between, and distant in time from the event. Landscapes change – bogs are drained – place names are altered, and maps accentuate previous mistakes. So the difficulties faced by the project team, lead by Glenn Foard, were immense. Only a coordinated multi-disciplinary approach – soil experts, archaeologists, place name experts, documentary analysts, metal detectorists, and previous research – as Glenn Foard stated 'we are here today because of Peter Foss' – has enabled the research project to achieve this result.

Luck has also played a part in the battlefield site being identified. Dramatically Glenn Foard described how, after four years of work, the team had been on the verge of giving up. Then a local farmer recounted how 'he lost a tractor' in a boggy piece of land. The search area was moved for one last time and the remains of the medieval marsh where Richard lost his crown was found at Fenn Hole!

One of the most important questions to be answered during the conference was, of course, what was the evidence supporting 'our' Crown Hill as the site of Henry's crowning? There is no direct written evidence of this event but because the name of the area changed from the date of the battle onwards – Garbrodfelde to Crown Hill, <u>and</u> also because it is the only topographical feature that fits all the descriptions <u>and</u> because of its proximity to the now established site of the Battle – the experts are all convinced that this is the correct place!

So a great deal of light has been shed on the Battle of Bosworth . However as Glenn Foard re-iterated ' *what we have found out is only the beginning*' – of knowing what people in Stoke Golding may have witnessed that summer day in 1485!

### Report to Stoke Golding Parish Council on The Battle of Bosworth Conference - Saturday 20 February 2010

Thank you for allowing me to represent the Parish Council at the conference held at County Hall. It was an extremely interesting and exciting day.


The programme of speakers began with Richard Holmes of TV fame who brought the conference alive by dramatically declaiming Shakespeare's words-: 'Now is the winter of our discontent Made glorious summer by this sun of York'. He then went on to speak of the importance of Bosworth. An expert on medieval documents followed whose topic could have been somewhat turgid but in fact was riveting and held the audience's attention fully. Other speakers included world authorities on archery, armoury, canonry and topography. However the undoubted star was Glenn Foard who had been in charge of the whole project. He paid generous tribute to previous scholars such as Peter Foss and the part they had played in the eventual discovery of the correct location of the Battle. He described how the team had worked cohesively bringing all their knowledge and expertise of different areas together. Dramatically he related how, after four years of work, they had been on the verge of drawing the unsuccessful endeavour to a close when a local farmer got in touch with them and told them about 'losing a tractor' in a boggy bit of ground. They moved their searching system for one last time. Finally the first lead cannon ball was located and liberated from the soil after more than 500 years.

This first discovery was followed by many others. The cannon balls are of great historical importance – and widely varying sizes. Work continues to try and establish from where the cannons may have been fired as the balls travelled a long distance even after they hit the ground. The star find – and only very recently discovered – is a beautiful small white boar insignia made of silver gilt. A possible scenario is that after the death of King Richard there was a rout in which the Duke of Norfolk was killed near to 'Dadlington Windmill' and his body carried to the then Chapel of St James.

The site of the Battle of Bosworth is revealed as close to Mr Oliver's farm, straddling the Fenn Lanes. Most thrillingly was the way several delegates referred with assurance to 'Crown Hill' where Henry was crowned after the battle ended. I asked the document expert if there is written evidence of this. This seems not to be directly the case – but because the name of the area changed from the date of the Battle onwards <u>and</u> also because it is the only topographical feature that fits all the descriptions <u>and</u> because of its proximity to the now established site of the Battle – they are all convinced that this is the correct place!

Throughout the conference there were short opportunities to ask questions of the experts – some delegates were unable to hide their chagrin at the loss of their long held beliefs as to the location of the battlefield. As the proceedings drew to a close I was able to speak of the delight that Stoke Golding feels that the oral tradition that villagers watched the Battle from the Church tower has been vindicated and to thank Glenn Foard and his team for finding the correct location of the Battle and of Crown Hill.

#### **Speedwatch**

The Leicestershire Community Speedwatch have offered the village a second Speedwatch scheme to operate from July 26<sup>th</sup> to August 8<sup>th</sup>.

The data and statistics from the Speedwatch carried out in the village during May 2009 has confirmed there is a problem with speeding in some parts of the village.

The data sent to the Community Speedwatch resulted in 1257 notices sent to the police.

This consisted of 1240 for Convent Corner-the junction of Hinckley Road and Stoke Road -11 for Wykin Lane, 4 for Stoke Road, 1 each for Station and Sherwood Roads.

The 1240 recorded at Convent Corner were as follows:

Speed	35-39	44-49	50-60	60+
Records	714	504	22	1

At the other locations the highest speeds recorded were-Wykin Lane - 47mph, Station Road -42mph and Sherwood Road - 36 mph.

There were the following repeat offenders: - 75 x 2; 10 x 3; 4 x 4 &1 x 5.

Prior to the village Speedwatch scheme a hidden camera on Hinckley Road, adjacent to the chicane, identified the following:

#### Harvest Helps Burundi

The Harvest Collection from St Margaret's Church was sent to Gitega, Burundi (via St Paul's Church Coventry), to help the victims of civil war, mainly orphan children. Many of them suffered from malnutrition so the money that is sent is used to buy beans for both eating and planting, powdered milk, sugar, medicines and soap. Your donations are greatly appreciated.

At the end of last year a container packed with donations from Coventry finally arrived in Gitega having taken months to get to its destination. In January two members of the church went out to Burundi for a week. They walked the 40 minute journey every day to email from the internet cafe. Here are some of their messages:

"The drive up to Gitega was punctuated by stops to buy food from roadside traders. The road itself, which is the main highway from the capital to the north, is poorly maintained with potholes all over the place. The roadside housing was mainly shacks which were little better than cells with a veranda. The basic building material was local clay bricks. Groups of both men and women were working the fields and men on bicycles were racing down the hill with their bikes loaded with bananas and other foods."

"At lunch we were joined by 3 children. I was told that one of the children's mothers had brought her to the church to be looked after and left her as there is no clinic near her village. The child's name is Gloria and she just fitted in with the other children as if it was quite normal."

"We then walked to the river to see the children fill their buckets. Some collected water in the buckets we sent and others in any container available. The walk down to the river involves a climb down a steep slope to a pipe that protrudes from the ground. When all the containers are filled the children line up with buckets on their heads or held in hand and start back up the slope to return to the compound or to their own homes. Laughter and jeers accompany the spilling of water by any of the elder children. They make this run twice a day."

"Arriving at the village the car stopped as the road was lined with well wishers and they all wanted to see what had been sent. From the welcome they were not disappointed. 
#### **More on Digital Cameras**

Having found my first digital camera and handed it in to the police, I wondered how an owner could increase their chances of getting the thing back after losing it. Somewhere in the depths of my memory, I recalled a photographer writing that the first frame of every film he used was a picture of his name address and 'phone number. This sounds like a good idea for digital photographers, for then all the pictures in the memory can be viewed without the need for developing and printing, so that's what I now do. Of course I could just stick a label on the camera, but that would get worn out or fall off. If you decide to do the same, simply write your contact details on a sheet of paper and take its picture or photograph them from your computer screen. I did think that I could simply save the details from computer to camera memory card, but although it seemed to work, the camera refused to display it.

Happily snapping everything in range with the new toy, we eventually wonder what else we can do with it. In my case I took a picture of the water meter. This had just been fitted in a totally inaccessible position and, cynic that I am, I wished to check its initial reading. Holding the camera at arms length under the sink I pressed the button. First attempt was not good; the flash produced so much reflection from the meter dial that it was unreadable. Next I shielded the flash with a bit of white paper and achieved a usable, if not artistic, result. Enlarging the picture on the computer produced the figures I needed as plain as a pikestaff. Since then I have done a similar thing when trying to identify hard to see components on my car. Here it pays to clean the subject to rid it of accumulated oil and muck. Sometimes it improves clarity if chalk is rubbed over the surface to make any stamped number stand out.

Talking of vehicles, have you noticed how some spare parts departments are manned by know-alls, ever anxious to display their superior knowledge. Next time you seek a part for an extinct vehicle, take a picture with you; that way your description and his need not agree as long as the right part is obtainable. Thus when seeking a drop-arm for a 1944 AEC ex-army Matador in Basingstoke or somewhere you can ignore the storekeeper who insists that it's actually "steering fore and aft lever". Well it would be if it was fitted to a Thorneycroft, and at least one other manufacturer called it a "steering side lever". So much for standard terminology in the motor industry, take a photograph and avoid confusion. It cost virtually nothing and produces instant results. The same applies to spares for domestic appliances. A picture can save an awful lot of trouble.

#### Stoke Golding Parish Council - February 2010 Meeting

Members of the **Speedwatch Group** attended the meeting. The Group was asked to liaise with Dadlington and Sutton Cheney Parishes regarding possible types of equipment and whether it may be feasible to share costs between Parish Councils. It was also noted that the Charity of Thomas Barton had offered to help fund such a project some time ago and could be asked if the Trustees are still able to donate towards this equipment.

As part of his report County Cllr Ivan Ould congratulated St Martin's School on winning the Leicestershire Secondary School Section for work on anti-bullying strategies.

#### **Wykin Lane Cemetery and Wild Life Area**

Installation of water: - The Regional Accounts Manager East Connections of Severn Trent is to come to a site meeting with Councillors on Tuesday 16<sup>th</sup> February. The paving blocks under seats work has now been completed and looks very good. The Clerk is to action the mole problem. The pond maintenance is to be put into the maintenance contract. As already noted advice is that a notice will need to be put somewhere regarding pond safety. Work is continuing on the Information Board for the Wild Area.

#### **Hinckley Road Cemetery**

A request for a flower bed on the other side of the memorial wall to match the existing one had been made. It was suggested this could be looked at when the remedial work is carried out and that a site meeting be organised to discuss details and cost. The name sign for the gate has been ordered.

#### **Recreation Ground Development**

Breydon Contractors have begun to plan the work on the paths which will begin soon. Equipment needs to be decided upon as soon as possible and it was suggested a small sub-committee be established extending an invitation to some members of the Parks Committee. Consultations with young people would also be undertaken. From this sub-committee firm suggestions will then be bought to the Parish Council.

The County Council Highways Department have confirmed they will put in a dropped kerb opposite Middle Stores with work scheduled to be carried out in February.

High Street and Thornfield Avenue signs are still awaited and the Clerk was asked to follow this up.

The Core Strategy was confirmed as now having been adopted Unpaid Football fees – the Parish Council awaits a reply from the Football Club February meeting The Charity of Thomas Barton confirms their contribution for dog waste bins and seats and new bins are to be sourced for replacement of old/damaged bins with additional new ones around the village.

Plan for review on update of Constitution: This was discussed in some detail and it was decided that it should be updated and made more appropriate for the Stoke Golding Parish Council in readiness for Annual Parish Meeting.

St Margaret's Church interment of ashes: The Clerk was asked to write to the Parochial Church Council to request a meeting with Parish Councillor representatives to discuss the matter.

Memorial Safety Policy is to be circulated for comments as soon as possible. Gritting / bins: Four areas around the Village were identified as in need of grit bins. The Clerk was asked to contact The Charity of Thomas Barton to see if they would consider funding two of them. After discussion it was decided that the one to be place by Middle Stores should be green and those in other locations yellow. It was noted that the Parish Council Notice Board is in need of repair and this is to be put in hand.

A draft letter was approved that is to be sent to a house owner in Arnold Road concerning a gate that has been constructed in their property garden fence allowing direct access onto Recreational Ground.

The next Parish Council Meeting will be held on Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> March 7.00 pm in the Committee Room at the Village Hall. Members of the public are always welcome to attend, although they cannot speak to the meeting unless invited to do so by the Chair of the Parish Council. There may very occasionally be matters to discuss from which the public and press can be excluded.
