First Responders

The Charity of Thomas Barton has made a presentation of £5,000 to its local branch of The Community First Responders.

The Charity, formed in 1400, was originally for "the provision and maintenance of footpaths and causeys", which enabled villagers to reach local markets. After changes authorised by The Charity Commission it is now able to assist in any project "for the general benefit of the inhabitants of Stoke Golding" and has provided funding for many village projects, including substantial financial aid in the preparation of a new cemetery, cycle training at the village school, floodlighting of St Margaret's Church and payments to the Parish Council to provide items including play equipment, grit bins, seats and dog waste bins.

Mr Paul Spokes, Chairman of the Charity, said "We are happy to give financial assistance to Market Bosworth Community First R esponders. They do a fantastic job as they respond if ambulance services are delayed and can be the first to reach a patient in an emergency, such as suffering breathing difficulties or a suspected heart attack. We are pleased to give them our support, which has enabled them to purchase a vehicle and additional equipment for the area covering Stoke Golding.

We would also welcome any suggestions for projects which meet the terms of our scheme, and give them due consideration".

Members of the First Responders Group are willing to conduct first aid instruction of approximately two hours duration in Stoke Golding. This will cover basic first aid and CPR (cardio pulmonary resuscitation) - a basic technique, quite easily

mastered, but which can be absolutely life saving in an emergency. Would you know what to do if someone collapsed in front of you? "Cherish the past, protect the future"

The Mary Rose

On Trafalgar Day, with some audience participation, Bill Davies hoisted the famous signal "England expects every man to do his duty" before launching into his talk about the "Mary Rose", the flagship of Henry VIII's navy. He vividly set the scene on that day over four hundred years ago, with the French Fleet blockading Portsmouth and the English Fleet preparing to set sail to do battle. The King and his courtiers had assembled at a nearby vantage point to watch the encounter, when to everyone's horror the flagship and pride of the fleet capsized and sank.



The watchers, who could hear the cries of the drowning sailors, were powerless to help.

Centuries later, disaster turned into triumph when a spectacular recovery, under the watchful eyes of a worldwide TV audience, brought the Mary Rose back to the surface and returned her to the Naval Dockyard at Portsmouth. Since then, conservation work has been undertaken on the remains of the hull and the thousands of artefacts that were recovered from the wreck site.

Apart from the ship itself, the artefacts have given us a snapshot of life in the Tudor period for all levels of society. For example, there were no left and right shoes, just a single shape for either foot. Lice were a common problem for rich and poor with combs being the answer, but the higher the status the more elaborate and expensive the comb.



Surgery was still a branch of butchery and the earliest anaesthetic was a blow to the head with a mallet. The Doctor's chest had a full set of instruments that would have been used to operate on wounded sailors during and after the battle.

Similarly the Carpenter's chest had all the tools required to patch up and maintain a wooden vessel, not only against battle damage, but also against the normal wear and tear of sailing.

Finally as the ship was going into battle, the weapons recovered have provided a significant window into our understanding of archery and early ordinance that was used at the time.

With a comprehensive range of slides and an in-depth knowledge of his subject, Bill was able to bring into the Baxter Hall the smell of the sea, the force of the waves and the roar of the wind. A great evening enjoyed by all who were present.

More about Steph's greenfinches

feeding area to scoff the



It broke my heart to watch the greenfinch desperately trying to eat seeds which had dropped from the bird-feeder in my garden. It was fluffed up like a baby bird and cheeping pitifully. It was early September and I was working in the garden and the greenfinch didn't act normally at all; instead of flying away when I approached, it just stood there looking at me. Clearly something was wrong. After an hour or two, it keeled over and died.

Over the next two weeks, more greenfinch bodies were added to my wheelie bin. I searched the RSPB website for information and what I found was horrendous. It seems that the trichomonad parasite has afflicted our finch population for several years now and it's estimated that greenfinch numbers have been cut by a third.

RSPB advice was to remove all feeding stations and bird baths for about six weeks to prevent birds from congregating and hence passing the parasite to others. The parasite itself can only survive on the host, so hopefully it would die out along with the infected birds and not spread to others. For the first few days, the birds visited the garden as usual, but were surprised to find nothing put out for them. I put notices in local magazines and on the village notice board, because there's no point one person taking these steps if everyone else continues to feed the birds; the birds will simply gather elsewhere and the parasite will continue its destruction.

After five weeks I disinfected all the feeders, the bird table and the bird bath and put out fresh seeds and peanuts. My resident robin found them within an hour, and on the second day the tits came; first the bold great tits, with their habit of making short and quick visits to grab a seed to take away and later the bluetits. After a few more days, the chaffinches arrived, then the bigger birds re-discovered the bird table – collared doves, and woodpigeons recommenced their swooping flight onto the roof of the bird table, and then as usual fidgeted about, trying to slide down the roof and into the

seeds. Before long a male bullfinch appeared, along with sparrows, hordes of starlings, and the obligatory magpie - the garden started to feel almost normal again. Eventually, my favourite birds realised there was food for them. Goldfinches flew in, a dozen at a time, flitting from one station to another in search of their first choice sunflower hearts. These pretty birds always lift my heart, with their little red faces and vellow wing flashes. They stay on the feeders for several minutes and then suddenly all fly off, perhaps aware of one of our many village cats or the male sparrowhawk who lies in wait half-hidden on the fence, before suddenly making a raid on the feeders and taking a surprised little bird. So far I haven't seen the lesser spotted woodpecker who likes to peck at peanuts in the feeder furthest from the house; nor the green woodpecker who favours a particular patch of my lawn (maybe there are crane fly grubs there in the summer). I haven't seen any greenfinches yet, so maybe they were badly hit by the parasite and numbers need to build up again. We are so lucky in the village to have such a wide variety of birds visit our gardens. More importantly, none of the birds I have

been studying so carefully since starting to feed them again have shown the trichomonosis symptoms, and I am hoping it has been eradicated from the village. Just in case it is still around, I am following the RSPB's advice and putting out small amounts of food at any one time, changing the feeders every day or so, changing the water in the bird bath every day and cleaning and disinfecting everything every time. The RSPB has a terrific new Ring-Pull feeder which is very easy to dismantle so that every part can be properly cleaned; not cheap, at over £20 each, but worth it, I think, to try to stop the dreadful parasite which has decimated our bird population so drastically. Meanwhile, I'm still looking out for the greenfinches...

From Stoke Golding Parish Council

As many of the residents will already know, the developers, 'Morris Homes East', has appealed against the refusal of planning permission to build houses on the Sherwood Road site. It is not yet known when the hearing will take place but it is unlikely to be before the New Year. There are some details on the Hinckley and Bosworth Borough Council website and we understand that anyone who commented on the original Planning Application will be contacted to see if they wish to contribute when the Planning Inspector holds the hearing. The Parish Council has asked for a meeting with Simon Wood of the HBBC Planning Department to discuss the implications of the Morris Homes appeal. The Parish Council will make all efforts to keep residents informed as matters progress with the arrangements for the appeal hearing. Hopefully it will also contribute to the process on behalf of the village. In previous meetings, regarding the proposed developments for Stoke Golding, the majority of residents have expressed their support for the use of the Brownfield Convent site ahead of the Sherwood Road site. As elected representatives of the village it is important that the Parish Council have regard to the views of all residents and welcome any comments you may have on the matter.

Glass Blower's Beautiful Baubles!



Richard Golding, a master glass blower based at Shenton Station, has recently perfected the art of making Christmas tree baubles amongst his other amazing creations – just in time for the festive season!

Richard has been glass blowing for 30 years after leaving his job as an electronics engineer with the Navy. He had a choice of going into weapon guidance systems, making games machines or doing something completely different – so he chose the latter.



Following a course at the Glass Centre at Brierley Hill, he founded and gradually built up his first company, Okra Glass, which continues to be very successful today, with collectable giftware designed and made by Richard's former partners Dean Hopkins and Karinna Sellars.



In June 2010 Richard moved to the studio at Shenton Station and started his new company Station Glass. The station building proved too small for a conventional furnace so he called in the help of engineer and inventor extraordinaire, Merlyn . He worked his magic to create the smallest and most energy efficient glass blowing equipment in the world, heating the glass to 1,175 °C (enough to roast your turkey in seconds if you have cooker problems over Christmas!)

Ruth and I visited Shenton Glass and watched magic performed before our eyes as a blob of molten glass rolled in a few broken pieces of coloured glass was transformed into a beautiful, unique Christmas bauble – with Richard making it look very easy.

The studio has a wide range of items on display including glass birds, pendants, paperweights and vases and they range in price from £10 upwards. Richard can even make bottle stoppers to order.

St. Nicholas – Santa Claus – Father Christmas

St. Nicholas was bishop of the coastal town, Myra, in Turkey, in the 4th century therefore he naturally became the patron saint of sailors. He is also associated with saving the lives of three girls and added being the saint of children to his holy portfolio!

His Americanised name is Santa Claus. Personally, I prefer Father Christmas (FC). But Turkish St. Nicholas, American Santa Claus or old-fashioned British Father Christmas – the venerable gentleman provides an excellent Christian lesson at Christmas-time.

We are taught that it is better to give than to receive and FC epitomises that teaching. Despite a multitude of mince pies and a brewery-worth of beer – left by hospitable, hopeful children – on the whole, FC stands for universal giving. He is the gift donor par excellence – the master of the present presentation.

And so, in the midst of the festival of the coming of the Prince of Peace, we have this secular, non-religious, example of selflessness. Despite Christian criticisms of some of the excesses of our present day Christmases – we retain the picture of this jovial, generous, delight-in-giving person derived from a Turkish bishop.

The central gift that God gives the world at Christmas is his son – Jesus – born, not surrounded by tinsel and baubles, but in a poor house for farm animals. At the heart of this coming season – secular or religious – is giving.

The word was made flesh – the religious and secular concepts of giving are merged.


Kevin Cowley

Stoke Golding Parish Council - October

County Cllr Ivan Ould reported on County Council issues that he is involved with, including the Leicestershire Rural Partnership Management, a 'Sustainable Community Strategy' pursued together with a 'Local Enterprise Partnership' involving both the City and County and 'Affordable Rural Housing' issues. **MIRA meeting** on 11th October – a Parish Councillor agreed to attend this on behalf of the Parish Council.

Arson incident at the Recreation Ground - a letter from the Police was read out to the meeting giving an update regarding this matter. The letter stated that the Police had concluded their enquiries and had identified and dealt with the three offenders. Final warnings and reprimands have been issued. The Clerk was asked to write to the Police thanking them for their prompt action and for keeping the Parish Council informed.

The Parish Council was informed that the **HBBC Licensing Department** had spoken with the licensees of the George and Dragon regarding loud music on August 22nd. It had been explained that they were not actually covered to hold live music outside and this would be reiterated to them at the time of the next inspection.

External Audit of Accounts – the Clerk confirmed that these accounts had now been approved.

Dog Waste collection –the Clerk was asked to enquire further with regard to costs and to obtain a map of all bin locations for when the new contractor is appointed.

Memorial Headstones – a further inspection to be arranged of the headstone repairs remaining uncompleted.

Grounds Maintenance Contract –the planned supplementary maintenance work required to the Wykin Lane Cemetery and new pathway at the Recreation Ground to be included in the existing Maintenance Contract was being finalised. Concerns were expressed by the Parish Council of the undue care and attention to the maintenance at present being carried out around the new recreation pathway and the importance of an acceptable standard of work - this needed to be passed on to the contractor.

Moles – it was reported that moles had reappeared at the Recreation Ground alongside the new pathway and the Parish Clerk was asked to deal with the matter.

The Football Club is now happy with the condition of the pitch. **Ground Fees** -a meeting had been arranged with HBBC to look at other facilities in the Borough and discuss the criteria for charging the correct fees

Sports Pavilion - Proposals have been discussed between the Football and Cricket Clubs to build/rebuild the pavilion to include storage facilities. The sports clubs are looking to the Parish Council for assistance in this project. Further information is required from the clubs before any decisions can be made.

Planning Application Matters: New Applications: Park House – work to maple trees.

Closure of the Parks Committee: It was proposed the Parks Committee should be closed and the financial affairs wound up. Any remaining funds to be put towards the recreation improvements. The Clerk was asked to send letters of thanks to past members.

Salt bins and gritting: – Several new salt bins have been provided by the **Charity of Thomas Barton** and the Parish Council agreed that plaques recognising this should be attached to the new bins and perhaps to other items generously provided by the Charity. An offer had been made to the Parish Council to store extra salt supplies and a member of the community had kindly volunteered to spread grit on untreated roads in the village – the Parish Council was grateful for the offer and would consider it.

The Village Christmas tree was discussed and arrangements made for its installation.

The 2011 Census will be held on 27th March 2011- further details will be publicised in The Stoker.

A letter sent by David Tredinnick MP demanding greater powers to prevent illegal **Traveller Encampments** had been copied to the Parish Council.

Hinckley and Bosworth Borough Council Tourism Website – Ideas for Stoke Golding's entry were presented to meeting and agreed by all.

The next meeting of the Stoke Golding Parish Council will be its 300th! It will be held in the Baxter Hall on Wednesday 1st December 2010 at 7pm. Villagers are cordially invited to attend when it is hoped to serve some seasonal refreshments following the business part of the meeting!
