Stoke Golding Convent Closure

On Thursday 1st December a Mass was celebrated at St Peter's Catholic Church, Hinckley to mark the closure of the Convent at Stoke Golding. This brought to an end the formal presence of the Dominican Sisters in our area that had endured, uninterrupted, for 78 years.

The Sisters first came to the area in 1933 establishing a house and school in Hinckley, which older members of the community will remember as St. Albert's. The school initially educated children up to the age of 11 and this continued until as recently as 1983. A secondary school was established in 1944 but it soon became clear that the number of pupils involved could not be accommodated on the same site. The search began for an alternative property and a site on Leicester Road, Hinckley was identified. Negotiations were at an advanced stage when Stoke Lodge in Stoke Golding came onto the market. That property was purchased and St. Martin's convent began life there as an 11 to 18 years girls' school. The beautiful chapel, now sadly destroyed by fire, was opened in 1964. The school continued in that form until 1962/3, when it became the only Catholic High school in Leicestershire, under the leadership of Sister Louis Bertrand for the first 26 years. The excellent reputation of the school, gained under her leadership, continues today with its last two inspections being rated as "outstanding". The work of the Sisters was not just in the school. St Martin's Convent was a



spiritual centre, hosting many Women's Days of Prayer and welcoming retreat groups as well as providing general spiritual direction and guidance. The larger convent was vacated in 2008 when Bishop Malcolm celebrated Mass to mark the move to the smaller convent in the Lodge, which continued to provide the traditional warm Dominican welcome for those attending mass.

The closure of the smaller convent and chapel brings to an end one chapter in the story of the Dominican Sisters in our area, but a new chapter opens. The legacy they leave will continue to impact on our community into the future as the school, parishioners

and villagers build on their unstinting work. It is this work, the presence and the influence of the Sisters that will still be with us but in a slightly different form. It is a little known fact that Sister Louis is the only Sister who has lived out her entire religious life here and not been sent to one of the Dominican missions in other parts of the world, as is the norm within the Congregation. She is now living in Nuneaton and Sister Cornelia lives in Barwell. Whilst the two Sisters remain close by they will always be remembered with great respect and affection and will continue to play an important part in the wider community, moving forward in their ministry.

Computer Safety and Security – Helpful Hints (Part 1)

There are many risks associated with using a computer – such as viruses and other risks posed by our online world. This is the first of two articles, outlining some of the main issues, and providing some suggestions to avoid becoming a victim.

Malware

This term covers all sorts of 'nasties' that range from things that are a mild nuisance, through those that will mess up your computer to ways to defraud you of all your savings.

The short answer is to protect you computer with good anti-virus software (sometimes referred to as 'Internet Security'). The chances are that when you bought your PC it included anti-virus software – although normally only a 60 day trial, and often not from the best value supplier. Prices tend to range from £15-£60 – normally on an annual basis – but there are other options that may not cost you anything.

One option is to use one of the free products. In some cases these are basic versions of paid software (AVG Free 2012 has recently been recommended by Computer Shopper magazine), and I have also successfully used Microsoft's Security Essentials.

Some banks provide comprehensive anti-virus software to their customers for free (MBNA & Barclays for example) whilst others provide security add-in software (HSBC, Co-Op & Nationwide provide Trusteer Rapport).

You may also find that your Internet Service Provider will bundle security software in with your phone/broadband package.

You should also be aware of the way that malware is often spread – unfortunately some websites will entice you in and then get you to download something nasty. Up to date versions of Internet Explorer (& other web browsers) can block or warn you of these risks. Another common way that malware gets spread is by email – you are generally OK just reading an email, but be careful of opening the attachments or links in emails – even if it (seems to) come from a friend. Are you expecting them to send you something? Is the message written how they would write or speak? If it's from your 80-year old mother, would you expect her to write 'Yo Dude, how ya doin'? If in doubt, do not click on or open anything in the email. So the best advice is: make sure you are protected, and be aware & careful. **Children**

All of us should be careful about disclosing personal details – this is especially so with children. Many 'Social Networking' sites have minimum age limits (for Facebook this is 13 years) but whatever your age, think carefully about the information and photos you put there and who you allow to see it. Check that it is only accessible to your friends – and perhaps be selective of who you choose to be your friends too.

I would suggest looking at www.thinkuknow.co.uk – especially if you have children/grandchildren.

The Queen's Diamond Jubilee Celebrations in Stoke Golding June 2012


Saturday 2nd June Music for a Summer's Evening. Concert by The Stanley Opera at Stoke Golding Village Hall.

PAST TIMES

This is a copy of the original deed of 1400 for the Charity of Thomas Barton as translated from the original Latin. It still existed as a parchment document in the Parish Chest in the Church in the late 1600s, and in 1790 Nichols copied it into his 'History and Antiquities of Leicestershire' which was then published.

To all Christ's faithful to whom this present writing comes, Thomas Barton of Stoke Golding sends hearty greetings. That which is called the Pavement on the way out of Stoke and many other ways around the aforesaid Stoke, ruined on account of default of payment, as a great document sent now to all the tenants of the same area, or of other passers by, those who walk over the land there, or those working the aforesaid paths. Know, that I, the aforesaid Thomas Barton, moved by kindness, and Holy Charity, have given, confirmed, and, by this my present writing, have granted to Robert Peckleton, Richard Mould and T. Ward of the aforementioned Stoke Golding, two smallholdings and fields with their pertaining rights, in Stoke as aforementioned, and one dwelling in Hinckley, with all their pertaining rights, to have and to hold the aforesaid land and dwellings, with all their pertaining rights, to the aforesaid, Robert Richard and Thomas Ward to their heirs and assigns in perpetuity, from their feudal overlords, through the obligations and dues customarily owed them in law. And indeed, I, the aforesaid Thomas Barton and my heirs, will warrant and depend in perpetuity, the aforesaid land and dwellings, all its pertaining rights, by the necessary cause aforesaid, its repair now and as is necessary in the future as was said above, for, to, the aforesaid Richard, Robert and Thomas ward, their heirs assigns, against all peoples. In testimony of this I append my sígnature.

Given at Stoke Golding aforementioned on the tenth of the month of July in this first year of the reign of King Henry IV.

My Life on the Streets (but don't tell my mother) - Ellen Beatty

Ellen kept us guessing at the start of the evening as to the real



meaning of the title of her talk, leading to a certain amount of speculation. Once she started her talk though, she revealed that she was a Police Officer.

Ellen initially went to sign on as a dare from her girlfriends, after having been a secretary at various companies. Her friends took her into Kenilworth Police station so that she could start the process and to her surprise she got through all the tests and decided to give the job a try for a few years - she has now been doing it for over 20 years. She told us about an incident where a thief was stealing potatoes. Ellen put out a warning that the stolen potatoes had been covered with Chitting powder which would cause unpleasant side effects for anyone handling them; she then notified all local hospitals to let her know if anyone came in asking for help and she soon picked up the thieves. She told us of many other incidents that have caused amusement during her time on the beat.

Ellen stressed that the police are there to help the people they deal with and would rather be called out to a genuine query which turns out to be nothing to worry about, than for the public to not contact them and find themselves in trouble.

She told us about the new 101 contact number for the police for non-urgent matters, it will put you through to a police station in your locality, without you having to look up the local number. 999 is still the number to call in case of an emergency.

At the end of the talk Ellen showed us the body armour and belt which she wears to work. The body armour was very heavy and members were amazed at the weight she carries around each day.

From the Police Box

Software could help protect your new gadgets



Laptops, mobile phones and PCs were at the top of many people's Christmas lists this year. But expensive gadgets are also a major attraction for thieves and Neighbourhood Watch are urging people to consider making use of free software to protect their property against theft.

One option available that can be used is **Prey**, an application that helps track and find lost or stolen computers and phones. The free software can be downloaded directly onto a device and allows owners to trace the whereabouts of the item if it is stolen. It also provides a screenshot of a computer's running desktop and takes a picture from computers with built-in webcams.

The software also allows users to trigger a range of actions, such as sound an alarm, send a message to appear on screen, or even lock the device from being used. The Prey software requires an internet connection to work and will attempt to log on to the nearest WiFi access point available.

It can be downloaded free from www.preyproject.com

Anyone receiving valuable gifts like bikes, phones or computers this Christmas are also being urged to register their goods on a secure web based national database. The Immobilise register allows police to reunite rightful owners with their property and is a powerful tool in the fight against theft.

To register your valuables free of charge, visit www.immobilise.com.

By just taking a few moments to register valuables on the free Immobilise database and to download the free Prey application, people could increase the likelihood of having their goods returned to them, and assist in providing evidence for potential prosecutions.

We don't want anyone to be a victim of theft this year, so please take advantage of these free registrations to help keep your valuables safe.

Infant School Memories

I longed for school and well remember my first day Tho' its nigh on eighty six years My brothers sloped off leaving me at the teacher's desk But I did not shed any tears.



Stoke Golding Parish Council - November and December Meetings

November Meeting

Written Reports

Tree Surgeons report – their recommendations and quotes for work to trees in Hinckley Road Cemetery and the rec were presented to the Council and approval was sought.

CPRE's response to NPPF – it was proposed a meeting be arranged between David Tredinnick MP and Parish Councillor Representatives re the series of issues and concerns of the draft NPPF in relation to the Neighbourhood Plan. A site meeting has been organised by Transport on 8 November to discuss a possible **bus stop** siting near to the Andrew Close junction.

Councillors' Reports

Children's Play Area project – grants being pursued.

Water supply for Wykin Lane Cemetery – quotes now received. It was agreed to go ahead with the most competitive price.

Maintenance contract detailing breakdown of costs and frequency of work circulated to Councillors. Some amendments still to be made and will be presented at the December meeting.

Signs for Wykin Lane Cemetery – proposals put forward and quotes to be obtained.

A proposal for reduced parking on village streets and a 20mph speed limit - Alan White to be invited to future meeting to present a report.

Playground inspection

SGPC maintenance and ROSPA reports presented to meeting. Cradle seat on young children's swing to be replaced and sign has been damaged.

Planning Applications:

New Applications

53 Roseway – extensions and alterations to dwelling.

To resolve precept and Parish element of Council Tax

A motion was put forward for no increase in the precept. This was proposed and agreed by all Councillors.

Neighbourhood Plan

The Parish Council invited Andy Killip from HBBC Planning to advise on producing a neighbourhood plan and its role in the proposed localism bill and its relation to the draft NPPF - concerns and issues were discussed. He advised there was no immediate hurry to revise the village plan and no need to pursue it at the moment.

SmartWater and Neighbourhood Watch

The Parish Council invited Leics Constabulary and a Neighbourhood Watch Development Officer to advise on SmartWater and its preventative measures, and the benefits of Neighbourhood Watch - raising awareness of home security. Parish Councillors agreed to discuss, at the December meeting, whether to pursue SmartWater and initiate a Neighbourhood Watch scheme within Stoke Golding.

Convent Site Sub-Committee Report

A report had been circulated to the Parish Councillors by the Convent Green Site Area sub-committee detailing future plans to develop the area and how the land can be used. In presenting this report, the Sub-Committee identified a need to have discussions with MarCity about the site. It put forward the following motion. Proposal: If and when Stoke Golding Parish Council is offered the piece of land adjacent to the Convent Site would the Parish Council agree in principle and subject to favourable conditions, to take ownership.

Resolved: The motion was proposed and seconded.

Actions:

1) Clerk to write to MarCity to obtain confirmation of the verbal statement that ownership of this land would be offered to the Parish Council.

2) Parish Council starts dialogue with Mar City, HBBC and the Sub-Committee.

3) Formalise the Sub-Committee - Cllrs Mayes and Brown agreed to join the Sub-Committee.

4) Proposed to have a set of Terms of Reference of Sub-committee by December meeting.

December Meeting

County Cllr Ivan Ould's Report

Mar City development: Planners are causing delays because of the issue over affordable housing has not been settled.

Stoke Rd, Higham – traveller site: Ivan has sent a letter to planning against this application to extend the existing permission for one traveller, family and horses to 6 more caravans. It does not seem likely that officers will recommend accepting. Proposed 30 mph limit on Wykin Lane. Following a proposal from SGPC, Ivan has supported this and it has been agreed to extend the 30mph from the village to just passed the cemetery.

Matters Arising

Convent site green area – letter from Severn Trent. To date they have not commented on specific drainage details at the site.

Councillors' Reports

Football Club: The work on football pitch has been completed and is acceptable, but the Club is now obliged to play at the temporary ground for the rest of the season. It will be using Stoke Golding pitch next year.

Bus Stop: Cllr Brown suggested that a bus stop should be placed next to the bench, outside 20 Station Road. If there are no objections this could be in place within a fortnight.

Water supply at Cemetery: The contractor has completed his work. Cllr Brown will contact Severn Trent to connect the water supply.

Communications

R A Harbour's (tree surgeon) quote for horse chestnut tree on rec - it may not be safe to have a bench around this tree. This will be on the agenda for February to discuss removing the tree and replacing it. A further letter will be sent to Thomas Barton Charity to see if the trustees will sponsor a large tree and inquire if they would like the bench moving elsewhere.

R A Harbour has carried out work to the hedge behind the pavilion as instructed. It has left one property more open than others. A letter to be sent to householder to try to solve any problems.

Spinney Bank Farm – Farm Shop: Other local farmers are not happy about this as they do not appear to have applied for planning permission. Officers to investigate.

Village Notice Board – Advertisers are filling the board and not removing out of date items. Cllrs will check it periodically and remove obsolete items.

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
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
