A Cause for Celebration!

On December 5th students of St Martin's Catholic Voluntary Academy, members of the community, and invited guests gathered at the school to celebrate the completion of first part of our Apple Tree Project.

Mrs Brenda Carson, Head of St Martin's Academy, and students completed the planting of young apple trees in a tree nursery which, with a generous grant from Raglan Housing Association Ltd, has been established in the grounds of the school.

The project to grow a stock of young apple trees began 18 months ago with the students collecting and identifying apple trees growing successfully in Stoke Golding and Dadlington. Thank you to those residents who welcomed us into their gardens to pick their apples!

At an exciting 'Apple Day' students enthusiastically learnt about the many varieties of apples which can be grown in Britain.

A Year 7 student wrote 'When the apple experts came in I really enjoyed it! The three activities we did were looking at different types of apple, identifying apples, and preserving them. But last of all we got to taste apple crumble, apple cake, dried apple and apple juice. My best part was tasting things because they were all delicious! The most awesome fact I learnt was that there are 2200



different types of apple growing in Britain.'

In February 2013 student collected scions (shoots) from trees in the community and learnt how to graft then onto rootstocks - kindly donated by James Coles Nurseries of Leicester. Assisted by around 20 volunteers from the community, the



students bound the scions onto the rootstocks and then planted the new trees into pots. Well cared for over the following months, a fantastic success rate of 29 out of 35 young trees grew - and have outgrown their pots!

The young trees will be grown on in the nursery until they can be planted permanently in a community orchard.

Hopefully from scions and rootstocks will come the flowering of the young trees

and eventually the fruiting. In the future young people at the school and the communities of Stoke Golding and Dadlington will be able to enjoy apple varieties such as Howgate Wonder, Annie Elizabeth and many more. Truly a cause for celebration!



To say that Richard Durrant plays the guitar is rather like saying that Dame Ellen MacArthur does a bit of sailing. He is completely at one with the instrument and the result is breath-taking. The juxtaposition of his style of delivery

For King and Country

Lance Corporal George (Henry) Lovell MM

George Lovell was born in Hinckley in May1894 to Charles and Priscilla Lovell. Little is known of his early life but in 1911 when he was 17 his parents owned a fishmonger's shop in Market Place, Hinckley.

Shortly after this, he and his family moved to Stoke Golding where his father took over the Horse Shoes Inn on High Street and it was from here at the age of 17 years that he joined the army at Aldershot and was drafted into the 1st Leicestershire Regiment, the 1911 census recording him as being resident at Talavera barracks, Aldershot. He was obviously a career minded soldier for in the ensuing years he was promoted to Lance Corporal.

During this time he was awarded the Military Medal for Gallantry in the field. He was involved in one of the Battles of Guillemont on the Somme where he was killed on 15th September 1916. He was buried in Guillemont Road Cemetery along with 2259 comrades, the victims of the many Somme Battles. He also was awarded the Victory Medal and British War Medal.

The presents of Christmas past...

It is oft said when referring to Christmas presents that it is the thought that counts, but some of these offerings were so dire that the thought alone would have been an infinitely preferable offering. A tea towel presented in a tin shaped like a sauce bottle. A pair of matching egg cups bearing the logo of a well- known stock cube. The piece de resistance however, was a carton strongly suggesting that the contents of same would be a full sized bottle of Martini Prosecco, a tipple much favoured by the drinking classes of the area. Closer examination revealed that the carton in fact, held a cheap glass bearing the logo of the Italian drinks giant and a bottle of the product so small, that its contents would not have intoxicated a pygmy shrew. It is a testament to the power of the festive season that such offerings gained any sales at all in the run up to Christmas at the full price and little surprise that in the dawn of post-Christmas reality, BHS were struggling to give the things away.

Shoppers in credit crunch Britain have become much more alive to the guiles of the retail industry and, for most of the year, seek out and demand value for money. In the run up to Christmas something happens to cause them to lose all reason and basically buy the packaging. I'll bet it happens next year as well.



From the Curate at St Margaret's Church

Many years ago, our Vicar at the time visited us and on entering our living room remarked, 'Oh, it is just like being in church!' Let me assure you, there was nothing as grand as a stained glass window, or

any sign of a pulpit in the corner of the room! Oh no, he was referring to the plethora of candles lined up on our mantelpiece. The draft from the door opening caused the flames to dance, as if in a cheery welcome to our guest. Candles are not just for Christmas and birthdays in our house. I love candles. I just do. They simply are beautiful. Neither brash, harsh, or flashy, there is something special about the light of a candle. Candlelight illuminates what surrounds it with a delicate, enhancing and enlivening light, transforming the ordinary.

At the beginning of February, there is a celebration in the church called Candlemass. It seems to come just at the right time in the year, spreading light when it can seem that there is precious little of it about. In days gone by, it was the feast for blessing the candles of the church, as well as commemorating the special meeting of Jesus, Joseph and Mary with two wise people, Simeon and Anna. They had faith that they would meet Jesus and their long wait was rewarded on that day in the Temple. The timing is 40 days after the birth of Jesus and marks the end of the Christmas season. In March Lent will come and beyond that, we look forward to Easter.

All the darkness in the world cannot put out the light of a single candle. These wise words, sometimes attributed to Saint Francis of Assisi, are a poignant reminder for us when things are getting us down. It is good to meditate on those words for a while. Meditation is a sometimes forgotten part of the Christian tradition but is life-giving. Simply watching a flickering candle flame can seem to calm breathing and reduce anxiety levels. It can bring us to a prayerful place where we can more easily connect with God.

At times candles splutter and flicker and we are reminded of the uncertainty of life. That is where faith comes in. Our plans are not necessarily God's plans and trusting our lives to God is a constant challenge. To help me, the words from Psalm 46:10 sometimes come to mind, 'Be still and know that I am God.' Uncertainty and transience become held and calmed by the permanence and reassurance of God's eternal love for each one of us. When we rest a while in God's love, we can open ourselves up to receive His healing touch, illuminating and healing those areas of our lives that are shrouded in darkness. When we look to Jesus and learn about His life, our life takes on new meaning. We can feel as though we are bathed in a transforming light. This light is the love of God. Jesus' resurrection shook off the shackles of death and brought us to a new understanding. We become free to share in His eternal light - a light and a love that can never be put out.

Beth's Corner - Edwina Bradbury

I was looking forward to meeting Edwina Bradbury and enjoying her memories of Stoke Golding dating back to the 1930s. She's another of the redoubtable Quinney family. I'd written about her Aunt Eileen and her cousin Brian, and they all had connections with Hall's Hosiery factory, where I now live.

The first thing Edwina told me was about an original Deed mentioning the Quinney family as far back as 1870. Their great grandfather was born in one of the cottages in Blacksmith's Yard and her grandfather lived at Mile Oak just outside Tamworth where he worked for a butcher. Mother worked as a maid at the Vicarage. Dad met Mum when he was delivering the meat from the butcher, on his bicycle no doubt. When they moved to Stoke Golding, they lived in one of the council cottages down Station Road, but were told: "George should have wed a Stoke gel." The village didn't welcome 'incomers', and Mum came all the way from Tamworth! "The house was pure luxury with three bedrooms, a kitchen and pantry with the 'thrall' - a stone shelf to keep food cool. Every Friday night we used the copper to boil the water pouring it into an enamel bath on the kitchen floor. I went in first followed by my little brother and we were scrubbed clean with carbolic and honey soap." "We collected fresh milk daily in a jug from the farm opposite, and Mum would cover it with a cloth soaked in cold water to keep it fresh. We grew all our own food. Grandfather kept pigs and rabbits and chickens. We saved every penny. During the war, sitting on the field opposite, we watched the bombs dropping on Coventry, the flames lighting up the whole sky."

"School started at St. Margaret's and soon I was called 'a shining light'. Every day I had to stand and recite the ABC and a poem called "The Snowdrift" - a proper little 'goody-goody.' Dixey Grammar came next, with one bus a day, but none on Saturdays, for extra games, so we pedalled six miles there and six miles back, in all weathers. Leaving school at eighteen, I travelled all on my own, on the train to London and across to Victoria, to Brighton. I'd never been that far before, and when I got to teacher training college they couldn't understand my accent." There was a chuckle of amusement as Edwina told me this, and again she quoted from those days. "Stupid to send a girl to college 'cos they just get married." But this slight silver haired lady of 80 has been continually successful, from one job to another all through her long career. "My main subject was Art. I was taught to discover and think for myself. History and psychology were my secondary subjects."

Her first job was at Attleborough, helping the Head to defrost the outside toilets, followed by marriage to Herbert Foster, who worked in Hinckley Co-op. For seven years she was at Richmond School in charge of 40 pupils. Her first Headship was at Barwell where she stayed for a further eight years. During this time they fostered Paul and Marylin from a Leicester children's home. As Head of Battling Brook Edwina developed the school from seven classes with twenty-two teachers and eventually 542 pupils. Dealing with school budgets and the daily administration, as well as caring for her elderly parents, Edwina was diagnosed with heart problems, while still in her forties. She came back to the village, along with her mother Ivy. Sadly, she lost Herbert, but in time met, and in 1982, married Gordon Bradbury. "Oh he were a lovely man but he were no scholar." Another of Edwina's quotes from one of the family. She also showed me a reference written for her in 1964 and I'd like to close with a couple of my pet quotes from it. "Mrs Foster is an excellent class teacher

– with a will of her own! I think she has the character and personality to make an excellent Head Teacher."

Since retirement Edwina has worked in numerous voluntary capacities. Many will know her tireless work as Governor of St. Margaret's, Trustee for Hester Hodges and The Boys' Charity among others. I so enjoyed this uniquely successful and charming academic lady coming to have tea with me. Bless you Edwina, and thanks.



County Cllr Ivan Ould's report included:

Raglan Homes at Convent Corner: C. Cllr Ould reported on the background and latest issue on the shared ownership properties, and stated he had sent a letter to the Raglan Homes Chairman. A meeting is to be arranged with Raglan Homes. *Matters arising from November meeting:*

Crime-10 crimes reported for November. Police did not attend this month's meeting so the Council were unable to obtain further details.

Conservation Area:

New road name plates being installed.

War Memorial – leaflet from Heritage Group presented to meeting as a contribution towards collecting information on this issue.

Linda Gosling has informed the Parish Council that she wishes to step down from planting the village tubs. Clerk to write to Linda to thank her for the lovely displays she has done over the years. The Parish Council will be looking for a successor, but will ask Linda if she can still supply the plants.

Reports of Council representatives:

Wykin Lane Cemetery – Grounds-man to remove the wire fence, fix the top gate and make good the edge of the pond.

Hinckley Road Cemetery – ivy on wall to be pruned back.

Planning Application Matters:

New Applications:

Erection of two dwellings - 36 Station Road. Parish Council has submitted comments that this is outside the building line. Heritage Group submitted comments stating this will encroach on an important historical site and has objected to the plans.

12 Whitemoors Road - Part change of use of ground floor from residential dwelling (C3) to child minding (D1) including extensions and alterations to dwelling - Parish Council submitted comments pointing out design could be more sympathetic.

Trinity House 16 Main Street - Extension and alterations to dwelling -

Highway Extinguishment – Proposed Stopping Up of Highway Rights over land adjacent to 60 Hinckley Road.

Permissions granted:

Removal of condition 4 and 5 - Park House, 4 Main Street.

Raglan Homes

Discussed under C Cllr Ould report. Cllr Ward expressed concerns over the way the people have been treated and now awaits the outcome of the meeting with Raglan.

Barwell SUE - VAS (vehicle activated sign)

Mr Roy Mitchell requested the purchase of a 'Managing traffic data module and software bolt-on system' for the VAS signs to gather data on how much traffic comes through the village and at what speed.
