Tree falls across Wykin Lane



Since moving into our bungalow in 2001 we have had the trees in our garden regularly checked by a suitably qualified specialist tree firm, primarily to ensure that if one fell over we would be covered by our house insurance. To date we have had to fell two horse chestnuts that were victims of honey fungus. Recently, during an inspection, it was noted that two of the beech trees were

affected by giant polypore (Meripilus giganteus) which is of particular concern because it can cause extensive internal damage before any external evidence of its presence is noticed. As the trees were protected by tree preservation orders we had to apply to the council for permission to fell. Before the application was approved nature took its course and one of the trees fell across Wykin Lane. Fortunately no one was injured and damage was relatively minor. After initially rejecting my claim on the house insurance, the insurers subsequently agreed that as I had taken all appropriate steps to minimise risks they would pay the costs incurred, less my agreed excess. If you have large trees in your garden I would suggest that you have them regularly checked and look out for large "mushrooms/ fungus" around or close to the tree trunks.

Gig News - with a difference

In my quest to discover the hidden musical talent of the villagers of Dadlington and Stoke Golding I stumbled upon two very unassuming villagers, namely Jane White and Rachel Rees-Jones. It took me a while to unearth the facts as they are both so modest. Jane and Rachel come from musical backgrounds and are passionate about instilling their enthusiasm for music with children at an early stage and spoke about how they enjoyed the singing productions



with the children they had been involved with over the years.

They both performed with the Shambles folk group and released a rare and collectable CD! They have many a tale to tell about their musical travels. Jane sings with Stanley Opera and a highlight of Rachel's performing career was singing at the Cavern in Liverpool only 2 years ago. We know famous people who also sang there!

Jane and Rachel have both played a variety of instruments from an early age. Their musical influences differ; Jane is influenced by folk and classical styles, whereas for Rachel it was the music from the 1970s that stimulated her to learn to play.

The project they are currently involved in is the Community Choir. Jane and Rachel ran a choir session as part of Adult Learners Week in Stoke Golding last year and this was the catalyst for the current Community Sing for Fun choir. The choir consists of 25 regular members, some of whom have never performed in public before. They had their first performance, after only 7 rehearsals, at the George & Dragon's carols and mince pies evening on 17th December singing "Colours of Christmas" by John Rutter and the traditional carol "Infant Holy". People present were extremely complementary of the high standard of the choir. Both Jane and Rachel were staggered by everyone's enthusiasm and zest for the choir, stressing that it was very much a co- operative choir led by its members. The group have gelled well and the social aspect is also a positive side to the choir.

Originally the choir planned to run until Christmas, however it is going from strength to strength and they have booked their next performance for 22nd March in the afternoon on Dadlington village green as part of the Richard III re-interment. The choir is part of these two ladies' musical journey to make music accessible to all and to share this enthusiasm with others. - On Sunday 22nd March King Richard III's cortege will stop at St. James' Church and The Green, Dadlington for a short service en route to Leicester.
- This is to mark burials around St James' of many of the fallen from the nearby battle of Bosworth. Everyone from nearby villages is welcome to come to Dadlington to experience a unique royal and historic event. Parking will be signposted outside the village and people are invited to walk to Dadlington and wait on the village green.
- Prior to and during the arrival, service and departure of the cortege the public will be requested to provide an atmosphere of dignity and respect. A guard of honour will be provided by students from St Martins.
- After departure, food and drink will be available, including hot dogs and a bar in marquees and teas in the Village Hall. Artwork produced by local children will be on display. Morris Dancers will perform on the village green.
- You will be able to visit the historic church where there will be an exhibition of historical records relating to the 1485 battlefield. A local guide will be available to answer questions about King Richard's eventful life and the burials in the churchyard.
- Detailed timings for the arrival of the cortege are yet to be announced and will be confirmed in the next issue of the Stoker.

Dadlington residents John Walliker, Simon Rees-Jones and Keith Morton were in good voice at the carol singing night at the George & Dragon.



Mobile Library Service



Leaflets outlining more details of what a Neighbourhood Plan is will be available at the Meet your Parish Councillor coffee morning on the 17th January which is being held at The Methodist Church hall.

From St Margaret's Church

The beginning of this month, 2nd February, brings us the festival of Candlemas, or, to give it its full title, 'The Presentation of Christ in the Temple.' It's exactly 40 days after Christmas Day and it officially

marks the end of the Christmas season.

In New Testament times, 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy; it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, Jesus' mother, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child, to 'present him to the Lord'. At the same time she, as a new mother, was 'purified'.

The Temple was a busy place, full of people, noise, bustle and animals too – this was where they were sacrificed. We think of churches today as peaceful places, but this was anything but.

Through all that noisy throng, came the little family. Mary, Joseph and Jesus. There was absolutely nothing about them to single them out. There must have been many other families there just like them. And yet, two elderly people, regulars at the Temple, spotted them and responded in the most extraordinary way to their presence. Simeon and Anna recognised Jesus as no ordinary child, but as the 'Light for revelation and... the glory of Israel' This child will be a light in the world, they said. This is where 'Candlemas' comes in - early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day - hence the name "Candlemas".

We celebrate Candlemas in our churches on the nearest Sunday, which this year is 1st February. We would love you to come and join our celebrations, as, with the glow of candlelight, we remember that Jesus is the light of the world for each and every one of us, and we remember God's presence with us, lighting up our lives.

BETH'S CORNER

I spent a very interesting morning getting to know Clive Wright, the new Principal of St. Martin's Academy. He wasn't what I had expected the Headmaster of such a highly successful college to be. After I was signed in and given my ID a much younger man than I had anticipated, with an infectious smile and warm handshake came through the glass reception doors to welcome me. Now in his study, comfortably seated opposite each other, I begin to realise how many interests we share. Firstly, a strong Christian faith and also a special love for Missions. The Dominican Order of teaching Nuns

founded St. Martins in Stoke Golding in 1963. The Order originally came from King Williamstown in South Africa, and in July 1891 founded St. Dominic's School for young African girls in the capital of Zimbabwe, which is now called Harare.

Opening my notebook I ask my first question: "Where do you come from originally Clive?" His answer is a surprise. "I was born in Harare. This is one of the reasons I'm convinced I am meant to be here at this school which was originally founded at my place of birth." His enthusiasm for the school is infectious. "I've taught in some fine schools around the Midlands, but there's something special here. It's as if the school has been covered with prayer for many years. I've also got a wonderful team around me, and I love the village." Clive's family had been in Africa for at least a couple of generations. Both his father and grandfather had been water diviners, and worked for the local government finding water with their peach-wood instruments, telling the engineers where to drill for the water supply. "Wow- I never knew this really happened." The family came to the UK when he was nine, and settled in Sutton Coldfield. After university in Lancaster and teacher training college, he taught in many excellent schools. Clive's wife, Rebecca, is a Hospice Nurse, and he has four much loved children, ranging from 20 to his youngest at 11yrs. The family home is in the beautiful cathedral city of Lichfield.

Now I begin to hear all the plans for the future. The pupils will all be actively involved in the Richard III procession in March, with two of the seniors participating in the service at Leicester Cathedral. Further plans include 'Connecting Classrooms' a project financed and encouraged by The British Council. One of the staff is going out to Harare to make the connection with St. Francis School out in the bush, and then to an even more remote and deprived village school, planning for a September 'outreach' for the students of our fairly affluent Stoke Golding. Having been in short term missions myself – I'm thrilled. Finally, plans are already in motion for new classrooms behind the existing building, and, unbelievably, a real theatre, with its stage and sound and lighting systems. This is the third passion I share with Clive Wright – drama. He now has a Drama Teacher on the staff, giving a focus to the Performing Arts to the existing curriculum. These plans are all so exciting. I ask him to give me a quote to encapsulate his vision.

"My vision is to create a school where every child will receive the highest education, founded on a Christian ethos, with a Liberal Arts and Academic teaching."

Thank you Clive – I've loved getting to talk with you, and sharing your enthusiasms. I know your time at St. Martin's will be blessed.

ESMERALDA THE THREE HORSESHOES GHOST.

Last month we featured in the magazine Mr W.T. Hall MBE of Park House who was Stoke Golding's most respected historian. The story of Esmeralda the Three Horseshoes 'ghost', is well known to most village people. She was reputed to be a gipsy girl who was drowned in a well at the back of the pub in the early part of the 20th century, but who she was exactly, is unknown. In 1928 and 1940 Mr Hall investigated all records of the village and hand typed his book of which it is believed only three copies exist. It was never published as such and only his family were aware of the contents. However, Mr Hall's research did uncover a most remarkable coincidence in the story of Esmeralda. In 1397 a Stoke woman named Joan Roger did indeed fall into a well in the garden of William Wryhte and was drowned. These facts are all recorded in the Coroner's Rolls of that year which record is reproduced below. Could Esmeralda really be Joan Roger who died some six hundred years before and who took all that time to make her presence felt? One of the jurors in the case was a John Barton. Was he the brother of our own Thomas Barton who founded our village Thomas Barton Charity.?

Woman found drowned at Stoke, 1397. Inquest taken at Stoke, on Fridav in the Feast of the Translation of St Thomas the Msrtyr, 20 Richard II, before John Wychard, coroner, upon the view of the body of Joan Roger, wife of Robert Roger of Stoke, by four of the neighbouring villages, viz:- Hynkelegh, Wykyn, Hygham and Barwell, by the oath of John Purlegh, Stephen Page, John Wareyn, Richard Coupare, John Hedke, Henry Pieres, Richard Bayly, John Marshal, Thomas Barker, William Flanville, Roger Cokke and John Barton, who say that the said Joan went to draw water out of a certain well in the garden of William Wryhte of Stoke, and by misfortune fell into the said well so that she was drowned on Thursday next before the feast abovesaid, no one being about. Thomas Gardiner first found her, who came before the Justices itinerant John Bareyn and Richard Gylefor. (Roll 60 m.5).

Roy Mitchell commented on the LLITM Model; his research, and a proposed meeting to discuss the issues with regard to rural roads.

Cllr Ward reported on a meeting with St Martin's Catholic Academy to agree access for contractors, to build new classrooms, via the unadopted road next to the school kitchens. Also the traffic calming measures next to the school have been modified as requested.

Matters arising from November's Meeting:

Crime Report for November – one theft of a vehicle and one burglary. *High Street* - the hole has been repaired. The Traffic Management Team of LCC is investigating parking on the bend and will contact us in due course.

Speed Hump - has been modified and the crossing completed. Some snagging of kerbs still necessary. *Wicksteed* - has carried out a modification to the chest press, but has caused damage to the field with their vehicle.

Planning Application Matters:

New Applications: 75 Hinckley Road - extensions and alterations to dwelling. 112 Sherwood Road - erection of a dwelling – access concerns. Cllr Mayes to contact HBBC to obtain more detailed layout.

Permission granted: St Martin's Convent - work to trees.

Withdrawn: 24 Pine Close - convert existing detached garage into two storey annexe.

Cllr Ward stated that the planning officer has recommended refusal of the gypsy site on Rogues Lane.

Neighbourhood Plan:

A meeting will be held with John Preston of the Rural Communities Council on 9th December 2014, to receive some initial guidance before making a decision on whether to proceed with a Neighbourhood Plan for the village. *Morris Homes:*

A meeting will be held with Morris Homes on the 9th December to view the revised scheme and to consult further. Housing for the elderly was discussed. *Recreation ground pathways:*

The pathway around the village hall is complete. The pathway around the field will be completed when the ground is firmer.

Ground maintenance review:

Cllr Pegg reported that the specifications for tender should remain the same; any minor additions can be added once the contractor has been agreed. *Any other business:*

The recycling bins at the recreation ground could be re-sited on the rough ground near the gate, to free up more car parking space.

Cllr Mayes requested that the project to replace trees on Sherwood Road and the horse chestnut tree at the recreation ground be completed before the end of the council term. Clerk to follow up the offer of a young horse chestnut tree from a resident. Clerk to contact HBBC to enquire if this is possible.

Cllr Beale stated that if it was decided to go ahead with a Neighbourhood Plan she would be willing to head the project.
