Get Thomas to America

Most of you will recognize Thomas Hughes zooming around on his threewheeler bike. He rides around Stoke Golding with a smile on his face, running over peoples' feet if they are not looking! What a lot of people don't see is Thomas not on his bike. Thomas has cerebral palsy which has a devastating effect on his legs. This is both painful and disabling for him. Treatments available in the UK have been tried with little success. He has had Botox injections in his legs, he has had his legs set in plaster (which was very painful) and he has had intensive physiotherapy from the age of 2. As he has gotten older his body is growing but his tendons do not grow at the same rate. Something has to be done before he loses his mobility.

You may have read about Thomas in The Hinckley Times recently. There is a revolutionary operation in America which could change Thomas' life forever. The operation is called Selective Dorsal Rhizotomy and involves a neurosurgeon going into Thomas' spinal cord and cutting some of the sensory nerves which are affecting his legs. The operation costs £40,000. Thomas is on a waiting list to hopefully have the operation in October or November 2011.

Thomas' friends are organising events to help raise the money for the operation that he so desperately needs. Fundraising is through Caudwell Children, a national registered charity. Confirmed events are:

How fortunate we are to still have our VILLAGE! surgery and to have our dedicated GPs to take care of all our aches and pains. With all the political wrangling that's going on in Westminster about the future of the NHS, my heart warms with pride and delight at the dedication of everyone in the team, both here and at CASTLEMEAD.

On Saturday 11th June, there was virtually a 'full house' in Hinckley for the Open Day - dedicated to the study of ' Dementia'. Two memorably informative presentations were given by Dr. Dockrell and Dr. Patterson on this much needed subject with our ever increasing ageing population. They were joined for the second half of the morning by two members of the Alzheimer's Society who were also voluntarily giving up <u>their</u>Saturday. They were able to share where there were groups for Carers, as well as advice for patients and relatives from the local Leicestershire Dementia Adviser. We were also shown a very moving video as to the difficulties that families and patients have to face as the illness reaches its final stages. The loving care we witnessed in this short video was extraordinary and emotionally memorable.

The whole morning however, wouldn't have been possible without the voluntary dedication of the Patients' Action Group, based both here and in Hinckley. They were in at 9.00am to help get the chairs out, refreshments ready, filling the envelopes with all the information leaflets to be given as Welcome Packs to each person, and generally 'being there' to welcome and befriend. Behind the scenes and over many months they have also given up their evenings to discuss and plan. They made home-made gifts for the raffle as well as hustling many local business members in Hinckley to donate some very splendid presents. The raffle alone made £150... but the information and hope that morning must have spread amongst all those that came was beyond value.

British Championships Success for Jordan

Twelve year old Jordan Thompson of Arnold Road is celebrating his success at becoming the proud owner of a silver medal after competing recently in the British Martial Arts Championships in Milton Keynes. This year's Annual Championships, organised by the British Council for Chinese Martial Arts, took place on the 29th May and drew competitors from clubs all across the country competing in a variety of classes.



Jordan picked up silver in the 'Weapons Form' category, performing a dynamic and skilful routine, using the traditional Chinese wooden

staff, against competition from a variety of skilful young boys in the 10 to 12 years category. Earlier in the day he came just outside the medals in the 'Traditional Hand Forms' category in the face of stiff competition.

Jordan, who has been studying traditional Shaolin Kung Fu for a number of years, represents the 'Sil Lum Hark Fu Mun' club based in Bedworth. He achieved two Silver medals in the British Championships, including one for sparring in 2008 and regularly competes in club, local and National competitions.

Breakthrough Breast Cancer

Concluding Rachel's article about breast cancer (the first instalment was in our June issue). Rachel has first hand experience of the disease.

Nearly 46,000 women and 300 men are diagnosed with breast cancer each year and around 1,000 women die of the disease each month in the UK. The earlier it is found, the better the chance of beating it and I would urge everyone reading this to check their breasts regularly and report any unusual changes to their GP. Breast surgery is so advanced these days that a mastectomy doesn't have to be the end of the world. I had a 6 hour operation to remove, then reconstruct my breast all in one go and I can honestly say that my 'new' boob looks better than my old one! The worst thing about it all for me was the chemotherapy, administered over 5 months, which got progressively worse with each session. However, I must stress that life does return back to normal; you appreciate every single day of it and you get brand new hair! Being faced with your own mortality forces you to look death straight in the eye, realise that this isn't a rehearsal and re-evaluate your priorities. I love my life and actually think I am a better and stronger person for having gone through it all.

Breakthrough's way of carrying out medical research is unique – their scientists work closely with specialist doctors to turn breakthroughs in the lab into real patient benefit as quickly as possible. An example of this pioneering 'bench to bedside' approach was explained to me at the Edinburgh Breakthrough Research Centre when I was shown round their lab. It is literally one flight of stairs above the Breast Unit I was in, so that cancer cells removed in the operating theatre can be taken up to the Lab and examined under a microscope within an hour. Similarly, clinical trials enable ground breaking drugs to be developed in the lab quickly and cost effectively and made available to treat patients in record time. To date, Breakthrough has made tremendous inroads in the areas of prevention, diagnosis and treatment of Breast Cancer as well as developing drugs that could also be helpful for up to 80% of prostrate, ovarian, skin, womb and colon cancers.

I aim to raise at least £2011 this year through a variety of fundraising events. In January my two daughters, Sarah and Jennie, and I, along with Sarah's boyfriend Gareth, did the Great Winter Run round Holyrood Park in Edinburgh in sub zero temperatures. Last month Sarah organised a raffle and casino at her 21st party and raised £400 on the night and a couple of my friends completed the Great Manchester Run and have raised over £1000 in sponsorship. Sadie and Di completed the Hinckley Half Marathon and have raised 'loads of money' and I have entered the Great North Run in September and the Great South Run in October - the month in which I plan to hold a fund raising Ball in the village (date and venue to be confirmed) as it is Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

Carol Smith from Shepshed WI gave a most entertaining and very moving account of her search for her birth mother. She was adopted in 1948 aged one year and had a very happy life with her adoptive parents. In the 1990s her father gave her all the documents relating to her adoption, which prompted her to find out from whence she came. This led to a long and painstakingly thorough search by Carol and her husband, Derek, over many years. She found that her mother, Rose Ann Grey, was alive and well, living in South Wales. However, Rose did not wish to have anything to with Carol or, indeed her past at all.

Through diligent research, Carol discovered that Rose had never been married, had lived in many places, always working and living as a domestic servant with the same couple and had had five children between 1936 and 1956, giving three up for adoption. Only the last child had the father named on his birth certificate and it was thought that the husband of the household was the other children's father.

This man also fathered two other children, (not by his wife whom he had then left), therefore making seven siblings or half siblings in total. Carol showed photographs of all her new found brothers and sisters taken together, except Brian, the eldest who had recently died.

Rose Ann was living with her last-born son when she died, never knowing her other children – or indeed wishing to know them.

Carol told her story of finding her six siblings she knew nothing about with great humour - a really entertaining evening, after which everyone enjoyed strawberries and cream with homemade shortbread provided by Wendy Walliker and Jean Buckby.


