Stoke Golding community defibrillator (AED) available 24hrs a day...

We bring you fabulous news! For the past two years a few villagers of Stoke Golding have been working to secure the funding for a community defibrillator ensuring that is very easy to use and available to everyone, should the need arise. **Where has this initiative come from?**

The original idea was put forward by Roger Flavell who approached the **Stoke Golding Garden Show** committee to ask that some of their annual profit be put towards the cost. This was readily agreed but fund raising was then a little slow until Margaret Collier took up the reins with a vengeance. She managed to reach the final total needed in a very short space of time! The generosity of the **Stoke Fest committee**, who facilitated two auctions and donated the proceeds, is very much appreciated, and a big thank you is also extended to **St Margaret's School** students who kindly held a non-uniform day and donated their proceeds. The project was part funded by the **British Heart Foundation** and the device has been bought through the **Community Heartbeat Trust**. The **Parish Council** has agreed to take on the ongoing responsibility and very small costs for the AED.

Where is it housed?

The committee of the **Methodist Church** have kindly allowed the defibrillator to be housed in a special cabinet on the wall near to the hall entrance. **Local electrician Phil Thursby (PT Electrical)** offered his electrical services for free and has demonstrated his expertise by connecting the machine to the mains for us, so it is all systems go! This selfless gesture is very much appreciated by the

villagers and Phil has also offered to check up on the defibrillator electrics when he is working in Stoke Golding.

Dedication and future training:

Poignantly, the defibrillator is dedicated to the memory of Chris Taylor, who was a well known and much loved member of our community until she sadly passed away earlier this year.

Composting Toilet arrives in Stoke Golding!

Around 10.00 a.m on Monday 16th June an unusual sight could be seen travelling through the village. Resembling an upside down ark on a trailer you could have been forgiven for wondering if a flood had been forecast! However it was in fact a composting toilet constructed in mid Wales by Julian Russell - http://timberarc.wordpress.com - and en route to the Convent community garden site behind the MarCity development.

Negotiating the gateway was difficult but was followed by an even greater challenge - unloading the toilet from the trailer. Some anxious moments and the application of a number of principles such as levers and rollers finished with the toilet resting on its base ready to have the bins etc installed.

Memories of bygone days of outside toilets will be revived in those older members of the community but correctly used the toilet should be odour free and easy to maintain. Urine runs down one chute and solid materials followed by a covering of sawdust are collected in a bin. When this is full the other bin is used and the material disposed of.

The structure is a work of art and should last for many years for the benefit of the allotmenteers and other users of the site such as visitors to the community orchard etc. A formal opening of the facility is to be arranged. Meanwhile we can see Jag Gill - on behalf of Raglan Housing Association - funders of the project - congratulating Julian on his fantastic work in constructing the toilet. Thank you Julian and thank you Raglan Housing.

From the Meeting of May 12th at Dadlington Village Hall

Police Report – PCSO Polly Cotton reported no crime in Dadlington in the previous month.

Superfast Broadband will be available in Dadlington – no date yet available.

A donation of £250 has been agreed to Market Bosworth First Responders.

A letter of objection to the Planning Application for 75 houses in Stoke Golding has been sent to HBBC. The Parish Council principally objects to the erosion of the Green Wedge between Dadlington and Stoke Golding, and the prospect of increased traffic through Dadlington.

The Council Meeting was followed by the **Annual Parish Meeting** – one member of the public attended.

It was suggested that Heritage Street Signs be installed in Dadlington. The Parish Council agreed to place this on the agenda of the next meeting.

From a Dadlington garden

What are your childhood gardening memories? It seems that many people's strongest memories of early gardening are with their grandparents; for example, having their own little patch in Grandad's garden, dibbing holes for leeks or potatoes (and putting in the soot), early lawn mowing efforts under close supervision, making a miniature garden. If you are looking after children this summer (however young) do your bit to encourage the next generation of gardeners, as well as creating memories for later life. The Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) and Netmums websites both have excellent ideas for gardening activities with children of all ages.

Summer is a great time to sit out and enjoy your garden. Keep plants looking good by regularly dead-heading and you'll enjoy a longer display of blooms. Make sure you keep plants well watered, using grey (recycled) water where possible.

Summer is also a good time to freshen up house plants. Take them outside, gently hose down to clean off any dust (or put them in the shower and then take outside), add some fresh compost, (or repot if necessary) and watch them perk up.

Did you know that the world record for the tallest sunflower stands at a whopping 8.23m (27ft). If you can't compete with that then just be content with smaller ones and watch the birds enjoy the seed heads in autumn.

Bird Notes

Sam Johnson was fortunate enough to note an osprey flying somewhat low and leisurely over Sutton Cheney at 6.0 PM on Monday 19th. May. It appeared to be coming from the direction of Market Bosworth.

Following a report from a local farmer in Higham to the effect that he had witnessed 5 buzzards and a red kite flying around his fields whilst cutting grass, John Terry quickly visited the site to witness the spectacle. Either the same or another red kite was noted over the centre of Stoke Golding by Eric Taylor. Whilst mentioning to Linda Gosling that I'd noted a tree creeper down the wide track from the farm, she reported having seen a yellow wagtail, not so far from the same location. Also that goldcrest wrens had again bred successfully near the house.

Common whitethroats appear to be present in abundance around the lanes whilst lesser whitethroats, quite grey and white in general appearance, are by no means scarce. More locally, I've noted one of the latter near the canal just below The Swan pub and another along the path close to the pool near the new cemetery. Both species are readily identified on call.

Strange Looking Bird

I thought there was a very strange bird skulking around the bottom of the bird feeders at dusk last night. I put the binoculars on it and realised it was some sort of mouse. Naturally, being used to spotting diagnostic features on birds, I could not help but notice the large tall ears - really cute.

From the Rector at St Margaret's Church

This summer marks the beginning of four years of national and international commemorations marking the centenary of the First World War.

The First World War claimed the lives of over 16 million people and had an impact on the lives of everyone in every town and village in our country.

One hundred years later, we are all connected to the First World War, either through our own family history, or because of the way it changed the history of our communities.

Few communities were untouched by tragedy in the war, and every one of our churches played a vital role during those dark years to offer spiritual support and commemorate the lives of fallen loved ones.

So many men volunteered to join enthusiastically, full of hope, and full of patriotism, full of expectation, led to believe that the war would in all probability be over by Christmas - Christmas 1914. In fact the war lasted four years, and very many of those who volunteered never came back. A whole generation was in effect wiped out. The world became a very different place. Not only did virtually every family in a village like ours lose someone in the war, but many people also lost their ability to trust others.

Jesus was born into a world wracked by war and oppression, but came to tell us of the love of God who wants to give us peace. Jesus, himself, was the victim of violence, and suffered a long and painful death in the struggle for peace.

The way to peace for us, as we honour all who have suffered and given their lives for our nation in the war, is a way based on love, starting in the home, in the workplace, in the supermarket, over the garden fence.

So as we give thanks for those who fell in war, we remember the words of St Paul: 'Be kind to one another, tender-hearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you. *Ephesians 4.32*

The Praver of St Francis Lord, make me an instrument of your peace. Where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is darkness, light; where there is despair, hope; and where there is sadness, joy. ALY STEELE One of the joys of meeting so many different people that I've only spoken to over the phone, is imagining what they are going to be like in reality. Usually I've been given a few details, but it's a lot of fun building up a picture in one's imagination. I'd been asked to contact Aly Steele at St. Margaret's School, where she was currently their "Acting Head". The post of Head is still being advertised. However, I had been told what an excellent job Aly was doing in the meantime. Many wished she would accept the appointment herself. So... who was I expecting to appear through my front door on her day off from school?

The buzzer went, I pressed my release button. A lilting "Thank you" came clearly through the intercom. This was already beginning to sound very promising. I opened my door to a tall, slender young woman rather like those models you see gliding down the catwalk, except they usually look so bored and aloof. Here was a sense of fun, and a joy of life, a wide smile and easy laughter, someone who liked people, who adored her family, and, as I was soon to find out, has a passion for teaching.

The family only came to the Village in 1991. "Dad's job brought us here from Manchester. Mum was Manchester born and bred. On our arrival my twin sister Jackie and me were sent to John Cleveland College." Jackie lives on Station Road with her husband and small children. Her Mother and Father still live in the same house which was the original "Show Home" – which happened to be very convenient at the time. Aly starts laughing – "It's not a Show Home any longer". Music has always been a part of her, with lessons as a girl and apart, from piano, her other two instruments were, and still are, tenor saxophone and clarinet. Leaving college she taught at Westfield Infants School for the next seven years. (I could see the 'homing' instinct again). There seemed to be a perfect timing that meant that everything she learned at Westfield was intended for her next school appointment in 2007 as Year One teacher at St. Margaret's. Parish Council Notes - May '14

Residential Development of 75 Houses by Morris Homes:

A question and answer debate took place between Simon Atha and members of the public. The main points to come out of the discussion were as follows: Simon Atha explained that changes to the National Planning Framework have left the door open to developers to reapply for planning on sites which had previously been refused. Although at local level planning is influenced by the Local Development Framework 'Core Strategy', its impact is limited as it is overridden by national policy. HBBC is also vulnerable as it has not met its quota for a five year supply of deliverable housing sites. Stoke Golding is not unique in this situation; a number of other villages across the borough are experiencing similar problems. County Cllr Ivan Ould's report:

Cllr Ould attended a meeting regarding highway issues in relation to the MIRA development. He had doubts that adequate consideration has been given to the Dodwell/Longshoot junction.

A highways meeting will take place on 12th June in Stapleton Village Hall, to discuss highway issues in relation to the Barwell SUE development. David Tredinnick, Cllr Ould and Stoke Golding Parish Councillors will attend. *Convent Green Space Update:* Pauline Goodsell reported that Mar City has given the go ahead to lay bases and the compost toilet is due to be installed soon. *Matters arising from April meeting:*

Wykin Lane pot-holes: LCC Highway Inspector reports that it is not policy to reinstate grass verges, particularly in wet weather.

Jitty Footpath - Clirs Ward and Mayes met with Highways Inspector, Steve Hunt. It was agreed that the inspector would contact those with property bordering the footpath to ensure overgrowth was managed. A coating of tar slurry was also negotiated for Church Walk to prolong the life of the path.

War Memorial - Some funding will be made available from the Environmental Improvement Programme.

Appointment of Financial Officer: It was agreed to appoint the Parish Clerk as Financial Officer.

Any Other Business:

Village Street Planters - these are now in place. Stoke Golding Parish Council would like to thank Malcolm Watson of Station House for his services to the village. He gave many hours of his time and provided transport to assist in this project.

Recreation Ground - Cllr Fisher suggested that if appropriate funding was available in the future the Parish Council may wish to consider installing a permanent table tennis table at the recreation ground.
