Stoke Golding WI - April Meeting



It is not often that we welcome local speakers to our meetings but this month was a local success story, the making of Leicester cheese at Sparkenhoe Farm, Upton.



Changes to farming in recent years have meant that many local farmers have had to diversify and Jo and David Clarke didn't realise just how successful their venture into cheese-making 10 years ago, was going

to be. From a shared idea with another local character, Charlie Walton, over a few drinks in the pub one evening, a cheese-making course and much research into the history of Leicestershire cheese, the Clarkes have designed and built a successful cheese-making business on their farm. They now produce the only cheese made from unpasteurised milk in the country and are the only producers of handmade Red Leicester cheese in the county; now selling to many outlets across the country and around the world.





They use milk from their own pedigree herd of Friesians built up over three generations grazing on land without chemical fertilizers. The process uses

natural ingredients and gives David Clarke a strenuous workout three times a week as he cuts, mills and presses the 10kg and 20 kg cheeses - no two batches are quite the same.

This cheese is well worth trying as our members agreed. So pop along to Market Bosworth Farmer's market and sample this local produce for yourselves.



We always welcome visitors and new members, so please come and join us for our next meeting on Wednesday May 12th in the Methodist Church Hall at 7.30pm. Our May meeting always follows the same format and will be a discussion evening about the issues surrounding food labelling. Members will vote on the resolution for the WI national annual meeting followed by refreshments from our Committee members, (a special supper in itself!).

I wonder if I may offer some comments on the reports in your magazine and elsewhere about the latest finds at Bosworth?

A number of statements which have been made to the press and which are on current websites, are in some cases debatable and in others, untrue. Your own magazine reports that the area around Fenn Lanes Farm was 'where no historian had looked before', but this area is included as part of the battle scenario in my book, 'The Field of Redemore' 1990, pp.42-3, where I place Henry Tudor's position at the start of the battle on his march through the fields of Fenny Drayton (indicated by the Merevale reparations documents). The discovery of cannonballs in this area (if authenticated) is not surprising. If you read the footnotes of my book (p.73), roundshot has been found here from 1789 onwards.

Regarding the 'Fenn Hole' - in 1986 I mapped all the areas of potential marshland that might have existed in 1485 in the Fenn Lanes area (and produced a map of that) and this information has been used by Glenn Foard and his team. The peat in some of this wetland has been proved not to have been laid down after the Anglo-Saxon period, and in other pockets of this wetland, it can be proved to have existed at the time of the battle. This is implied in my book. I am happy for the conjecture now to be that the melee might have ended 800 yards west of the Fen Meadows in Dadlington, at the western branch of the wetland as it crosses Fenn Lanes, rather than the eastern branch. The pocket of peat called Fenn Hole on the border of Dadlington, Stoke and Upton I identified in 1986 when I researched the early enclosure and open fields of Stoke Golding, from documents I discovered at Sheffield (Davill-Baxter papers, see p.62, notes 37, 44, The Field of Redemore). This information was shared with Glenn Foard in 2006. (The Fenn Hole at that point, to correct your piece on p.6, is not still called that, as far as I know).

Another statement that was made to the press by Heather Broughton at the Press Conference on 28 October 2009 declared that the Crown Hill connection was until now 'anecdotal'. This is not so. When I did the work in 1985-7, I produced documents that showed that the open field on the west of Stoke was called 'Crownhillefeilde' in the late 1600s, and this, together with the William Burton information etc. is compelling evidence that the name was authentically connected with the battle in the century following. This has now been re-affirmed by Dr Barrie Cox's unearthing of what seems to be a pre-1485 name (Garbrodfelde) for the field, thereby showing a name change subsequent to the battle.

book. A further piece of thinking that ought to be done (and which I have pursued somewhat) is whether the suffix 'golding' does indeed refer to the battle. I think there is an argument to be made that it does. But that is another story and must wait another day!

Battle of Bosworth - what happened to the chair?

I read with great interest, last month's articles on the site of the Battle of Bosworth.



Being very interested in the battle for many years, I was curious as to what became of the legionary chair that was taken from a farm house on Crown Hill in Stoke Golding for the new king Henry VII to sit on when he was crowned.

Thinking that the chair was possibly taken to London for safe keeping, my investigations led me to discover that this chair now resides at Maxstoke Castle, 3 miles east of Coleshill.

In 1345 Edward III granted William de Clinton a licence to crenellate a new dwelling at Maxstoke.

It was actually recorded as a fortified dwelling manor house by Edward III, as the location and design could not withstand a prolonged siege.

Henry the second Duke of Buckingham became involved in a plot to overthrow Richard III and was executed in 1483. The Castle was then forfeited to the crown. Richard III visited Maxstoke in 1485 on his way to Nottingham and he ordered that parts of the Castle should be taken down and transported to Nottingham as he was undertaking major works at Nottingham Castle. This instruction was not fully carried out as Richard III was killed at the Battle of Bosworth (or should that now be the Battle of Stoke Golding?)

The new King Henry VII restored the Castle to Edward, Duke of Buckingham (the son of the second Duke who was executed by Richard III), who was still a minor. Due to his age, it was entrusted to Margaret Beaufort, Countess of Richmond and the mother of the King. Could this have been the time when the chair arrived at Maxstoke Castle.?

Many changes have been made over the centuries to the Castle, but it is now the home of the Fetherston-Dilke family.

If anyone is interested in viewing the chair, the Castle is open to the public one day a year, usually in June close to Fathers' Day.

A former St Margaret's schoolboy who moved on to St Martin's has a hobby which many much older boys would give their eye teeth for. George Stanley is the grandson of Paddy and Sandra O'Brien of Greenhill Road. When you see this picture of him in action on his 125c.c. Aprilia you could well believe he is in his twenties.

He has been encouraged in his sport by his mother Sarah (O'Brien) Stanley, who spent all her early life in the village and dad, Barry, who are both very proud of their son's talents. Sarah and Barry told me that George was 12 on 23rd of April this year and he has always been interested in motor bike racing. Last year he had 2 mini motos which are automatic motorbikes and are a replica of a normal sized bike; they were a 50cc bike. He went around the country racing, as far afield as Cumbria and Lydd. At that time, never having raced before he finished 2nd on one bike and 3rd on the other in the championship.

During the winter he and his dad came up with a cunning plan to race a 125cc Aprilia. He had never ridden a geared bike before so his dad took him a couple of times to some private land to learn how to ride a geared bike. On 9th April 2010 Barry took him to Darley Moor and there he attended Mick Boddice's race school. 




Composting

Poverty – Let's End It: Christian Aid Week 9-15 May 2010 Christian Aid supports work in almost 50 countries. It believes that everyone should have 'life before death', and is passionate about helping communities to find their own lasting solutions to poverty. It challenges the unjust structures that make and keep people poor and

provides help in emergencies. For each £1 given, 84p is used for direct charitable expenditure. The remaining 16p is used to raise the next £1.

Christian Aid Week this year is 9-15 May. It is Britain's longest-running fundraising week and has been a firm fixture in the calendar of many thousands of people each year since 1957. It is famous for the distinctive envelope that drops through the letterboxes of millions of homes each May – and for the massive impact that the week has made in the fight to end the scandal of poverty around the world.

Throughout the country there are 300,000 people who go from door to door every year, and our community is no exception – many volunteers will be living out their faith by taking part in the national house-to-house collection and organising other fundraising events. And every year it demonstrates the generosity of people in the UK and Ireland – giving money to those who need it most.

The residents of Matopeni, a slum area of Nairobi, Kenya, are among those who need it: People in this area have built their own drains and a couple of toilets to service the 300 houses there, but the toilets don't work properly. So the children have to walk across wooden planks above the drains, which contain stagnant water, sewage and rats. During the rainy season, the drains overflow and flood the houses with sewage and rats. Most of the houses also only have one room so people often have to go to the toilet in front of their family. They use plastic bags and then have to throw these bags outside as there's nowhere else for them. These are known as 'flying toilets'.

Jeremiah (age 12) lives in this area. He says, 'I don't like living here. The bad thing about this place is that when it rains, the drains fill up and water floods into the houses and we have to use a basin to get rid of it. It's dirty and we get sick. I've had a very bad cold and some pain in my throat. It smells bad. It's because people have no proper toilets.'

Building toilet facilities for Matopeni would cost less than £10,000 – yet it would make a huge difference.

Through our faith, our prayers and our generosity this Christian Aid Week, we can stand alongside some of the poorest people, in Matopeni, and around the world. Thank you for being a part of it.

Dyslexia-friendly Libraries

Libraries across Leicestershire have signed up to a new set of guidelines designed to make them more dyslexia-friendly. Over the next few months, staff are being trained to ensure they understand the basic issues facing people with dyslexia. Most of the checklist has already been adopted by county libraries and includes offering easy-to-read and audio materials, working with dyslexia groups and making reasonable adjustments.

This follows a national project - led by the Society of Chief Librarians - aimed at making libraries better equipped to help people affected by dyslexia. Around 10% of the population are dyslexic to some extent and at least 4% are seriously affected, including about 375,000 children. People with dyslexia are often successful at reading and writing but they may need reasonable adjustments to be made to give them additional help.


Nature Notes

Stoke Golding Parish Council - March 2010 Meeting

The **Speedwatch Committee** reported that Leics Community Speedwatch has offered the village a second speed-watch scheme to operate from July 26th to August 8th. They will provide their own vehicle activated sign (VAS). A summary report of statistics from the speed-watch exercise carried out during May 2009 confirmed concerns of speeding in the village. Complaints had also been received by the Highways Dept from Station Road residents about speeding problems along their road. The costs of cameras and logistics of sharing with neighbouring parishes were discussed. The Speedwatch Committee was asked to liaise with other parishes and to apply to the Charity of Thomas Barton Trust for possible funding.

Members of St Margaret's Parochial Church Committee (PCC) attended to explain the position regarding scattering of ashes in St Margaret's Churchyard. The PCC would like to apply for a faculty to allow a person's ashes to be placed in the ground under the turf. No memorials would be involved; there would be no sign of what had taken place and no material change to the churchyard. A site had been identified and there would be a plan of area to indicate what had taken place and ensure that it is not used twice.

The Parish Council is responsible for the churchyard and has a statutory requirement to keep records and maintain the churchyard. Therefore, as the Burial Authority under Parish Council jurisdiction, this would be deemed a burial and have a legal requirement to be recorded by the Cemetery Administrator. The Parish Council also confirmed that '*Regulations do state that ashes may be buried in a closed churchyard, subject to the obtaining of a faculty, but only where the burial does not involve the disturbance of human remains'*. The PCC has contacted the Diocesan Registrars, whose remit is to manage churchyard issues, to request further clarification.

County Clir Ivan Ould said that pot holes in village roads should be reported as soon as possible to the Highways Dept and he confirmed that Leics County Council will provide the grit/salt for any bins purchased by village organisations.

Wykin Lane Cemetery: Installation of water - a site meeting had been held with a Severn Trent rep - the Council awaits their reply. Information Board - work is continuing on this. The sub-committee had acquired prices for the construction of a board - Design/art work - £120, Panel printing - £53, Board construction - £240, choice of pictures to be finalised. Bird/ Bat boxes - The Charity of Thomas Barton has offered to fund the bird/bat boxes project for the wild area to the sum of £200. Maintenance Contract - a meeting had been held with the contractor to discuss pond clearance and other annual maintenance work at the cemetery.

Hinckley Road Cemetery - The Cemetery Administrator has sawn down a large branch hanging near to the pedestrian entrance. It was suggested to have a planter arrangement around the base of the memorial wall to be permanently planted up. The wall would also benefit from cleaning.

Recreation Ground - A proposal to order a 'Proludic swing' to include a safety surface and installation was agreed. Young people had identified 6 items of equipment and placed them in order of priority. It was agreed that 4 could be ordered. Work on the path would soon be started in order to complete the section by the cricket boundary before the season starts. It was suggested that the Charity of Thomas Barton be approached to ask if they would like to contribute with funding towards the Recreational Ground project.

Planning Application Matters:

Communications had been received re concerns regarding work being carried out by the landowner on a pond at Willow Stables where willow trees have been cut down. A discussion was held as to whether funding could be accessed to help the landowner maintain the pond but it may not be possible to enforce maintenance. Enforcement officers have been asked to establish the status of land.

New Applications:

25 Wykin Lane – extension and alterations to dwelling, 27 Wykin Lane – extension and alterations to dwelling, 6 Church Walks – extension and alterations to dwelling, Compass Fields Farm, Wykin Lane – change of use from agricultural building to workshop (B1C) including erection of toilet unit

Permissions granted:

26 High Street - extension and alterations to dwelling.

Other items

Constitution: A Draft Constitution was circulated to Councillors and a motion put forward to adopt amendments.

Memorials: An updated draft 'Memorial Safety Policy' was circulated to Parish Councillors.

MarCity Developers: Councillors were informed that MarCity is in talks with Planning Officers at HBBC.

The Recreation Field is now on an automatic annual safety check system by ROSPA.

Football fees – The Parish Clerk to reply to the Football Club asking them to complete payment for their use of the 3 football pitches 2009- 2010.

The next Parish Council Meeting will be held on Wednesday 5th May at 7.00 p.m. in the Committee Room at the Village Hall. Members of the public are welcome to attend, although they cannot speak to the meeting unless invited to do so by the Chairperson. There may occasionally be matters to discuss from which the public and press can be excluded.
