Dear Residents

Changes to the Centre of Stoke Golding

You may have heard that as a result of a recent review of our Conservation Area by Hinckley and Bosworth Borough Council a proposal has been put forward that the War Memorial (at present in the Hinckley Road Cemetery) should be relocated to near its original site where High Street joins with Main Street/Station Road.

I fully support this idea. I believe that such an important memorial, which commemorates the men of this village who died in both world wars, should be at the heart of our community. It should be visible to all as they go about their everyday lives and seen on a regular basis. I understand that Mr and Mrs Walton of Park House may make land in their grounds available for the memorial.

Transfer of the memorial from its present site would need to be undertaken by specialist masons and HBBC has agreed to this and to replacing the lowest step of concrete with dressed stone. The perimeter wall to Park House grounds will need to be demolished and rebuilt anyway as the wall has been assessed by the Borough Council as dangerous and unstable.

The chestnut trees on the edge of Park House grounds have been diagnosed with disease and in the next few years will be felled to avoid injury and damage. What a 'hole' this will leave in the centre of the village! Can I suggest that the relocation of the War Memorial will provide a much need focal point until replacement trees can be grown.

It also seems to me that 2014 is a highly appropriate year in which to return the War Memorial to the prominent position in the village close to the one which villagers originally chose.

For King and Country

Cyril George Wright MM

Cyril's parents were George Wright and Susan Wright who had long lived in the village. They had thirteen children one of whom, John, is still alive and living in Derbyshire. Cyril's sister-in-law, Geraldine Wright lives in the village. Cyril was born in 1914 and, like his two brothers Joseph and Stanley fought for the country in the Second World War. These two brothers were killed during the conflict.

Cyril joined the Border Regiment and found himself stationed in the Far East, fighting in the jungles of Burma. On 3rd February 1945 at Satpangon, Burma, acting Sergeant Wright's company was under heavy attack, and in the attack Cyril was wounded. He went over ground swept by heavy enemy fire to retrieve

equipment twice before returning to his lines. Later in the battle he went out twice more, under heavy fire searching for ammunition to keep his company's guns firing and was thus awarded the Military Medal for gallantry in the field. His commanding officer in recommending the medal said, *"Wright's gallant conduct and the unfailing way in which he carried out, under heavy fire, every task assigned to him, was an inspiration to all who saw him, and he played a great part in enabling the company to maintain its foothold in the village, until the supporting company arrived."*



He returned to the village suffering greatly from the after effects of the war and five years later he needed specialist treatment to aid his recovery. An article in The Hull Daily Mail of Saturday 25th November 1950 records the help he was given by the people of Stoke Golding who stood by their decorated soldier.

Village will pray for its war hero

"Women were in tears at Stoke Golding in South Leicestershire today, as the village's war hero Cyril Wright MM was carried from his village home to begin the first stage of his journey to Kassel in Germany, where he is to be treated by Dr Walter Voeler for a nervous complaint, the legacy of war service in the Burma jungle, which doctors had pronounced as incurable. Six hundred villagers, who had crusaded for Cyril Wright's treatment in Germany stood in the streets for one and a half hours, waiting for the fog blanket to lift from Desford Airfield. Then the roar of a plane was heard and they peered into the mists as it took off and headed east. Tomorrow these villagers who raised £500 in ten days will go to church to pray for the cure of Cyril Wright."

Though by no means completely cured, the public spirited action of his village friends enabled Cyril to live out his life until 18th September 1981. He was buried in Hinckley Road Cemetery, Stoke Golding where his much weathered tombstone reads simply *Cyril George Wright MM*.

Smart Water is a liquid that can be applied to any object from small jewellery pieces to large screen TVs, from car keys to lawn mowers.

The water has unique DNA that is registered to you and identifies any stolen object as yours. If found on suspects it identifies them as the criminals who stole your possessions.

The **Smart Water** pack includes warning labels that can be attached to windows and doors warning that you are **Smart Water** home.

Smart Water is being offered to residents at a very reduced rate of £12 and is available at Stoke Golding Post Office. It is claimed that Smart Water is a better deterrent than house alarms.

The Parish Council intends to make Stoke Golding a **Smart Water** village and is planning to place notices on the village signs stating that we are a **'Smart Water Village'.**

Late Summer Bird News

The month of July came to a close with much excitement following confirmation of a first summer black-crowned night heron at



Thornton Reservoir. Also, during this purple patch for the site, a great white egret put in a brief appearance.

The night heron, an annual though scarce rarity to Britain, occurs usually between April and June, having spent the winter in Africa. Sometimes, however, the species will turn up in March, especially on The Isles of Scilly.

Monthly wildfowl and wader counts at Brascote Pits yielded a common sandpiper. Further, among the 61 lesser black- backed gulls on adjacent fields, I should imagine a significant number had arrived from various parts of Europe.


Though I managed a brief view of a hobby falcon flying across Wykin Lane towards fields at the bottom of the recreation ground, I have had little luck in this respect whilst cycling around villages the likes of Upton, Shenton and Sutton Cheney.

At the invitation of Steven Shepherd, I visited his parent's farm, opposite the railway station in Shenton. He took me around the barns and outbuildings to view some of the many swallow nests, perhaps over forty.

A number of people have drawn attention to the presence of green woodpeckers around the village. Again, they are very vocal around the primary school, particularly in the early morning when they can be seen on the grass verges in Sherwood Road, as well as on my lawn.

Beth's Corner

One of the joys of hearing stories of the old days and ways, and the lives of folk from village families, is the way that they completely lift my spirits from the doldrums. A month ago I was stuck in the George Eliot hospital with a diagnosed fracture of the pelvis, and here I am still stuck at home in The Courtyard" largely dependent on my walker frame. But at least I know I can scribble out a story, sitting on the sofa while chatting to my chosen storyteller. I first met Brian a couple of years ago when he and his wife Margaret came to tea with mutual friends. He had wanted to have a look at the flats that now took the place of Hall's Hosiery factory where he worked from the age of 14. Brian was born in the village on 6th April 1931 - part of the large Quinney family, Aunt Eileen still lives at Laburnum Cottage. Brian's father became one of the Head foremen at Hall's, and the family lived in the High Street opposite Mulberry Farm, then owned by Mr. Gearey, once the village blacksmith. This was a short few steps to school, which in those days took place in two buildings. The primary school was in the Old School House opposite the church gates, while the older children were in the Baxter Hall. "We all went home for lunch, and came back until four. The Dadlington children all came too. They all had to walk to and from school in all weathers, pouring rain, snow and sleet, up that hill and back again. "Did you have homework Brian?" I asked "No not in those days - and I never ever had a school report at end of term. We only had about three teachers in the school then and after the eleven plus, I went on to Westfield Modern for Boys in Hinckley." Leaving school at 14 Brian came to Hall's Sock factory as an apprentice mechanic under the guidance of the two Head Mechanics. I've seen pictures of the factory as it was in those days and wondered if that big archway was the original main entrance for the workers as well as the horse and cart. "Yes we came in at 8.00.am and clocked on in there, and clocked out for lunch at 12.30 to 1.30, and then back again until 6.30pm six days a week .I was the 100th worker that clocked in. It was a very happy time at Hall's." At eighteen it was time for National Service. Brian chose to be trained as a professional cook in the Royal Artillery and was sent to cookery school at Lichfield, before being stationed in the "New Territories", along the border between British Hong Kong and Communist China, for 17 months. After de-mob he met Margaret at the local Hinckley Ballroom on 'Happy Palais' Night. They married at St. Mary's and set up home in "Rose Cottage" in Factory Road, both working at Hall's again, this time in Coventry Road, Hinckley. "Do you still enjoy cooking Brian?" There was a pause..... "Well I have to. Now I'm on my own."

"Oh Brian, I'm so sorry! – I didn't know. When did you lose Margaret?" "Well it was May a year ago. We had the funeral service at the Village Baptist Chapel. There was a god turn out, and after the Crem' she's in the new Wykin Lane cemetery - a great place to be. It would have been 57 years together."

.I'm glad he's bought himself a new companion, a cross- bred collie Kizzy. "She's great company – didn't really want to see me come out without her - better get back."

"Yes – Thank you Brian – take care."

Sometimes she would watch for us coming home from school To run an errand or two but not before tea Then she hoped we would stay a while and play cards or tiddlywinks For we all enjoyed each other's company

A lovely clematis festooned her brick porch Much admired (and envied) by all and sundry She swore that the only attention it had Was rainwater, and weekly dollops of old tea leaves every Monday

We admired Miss Pugh's beautiful harmonium Which we looked forward to her teaching us to play But fate intervened, Miss Pugh suddenly died And our happy little world just crumbled that day

Friendly new owners moved in but that warm special presence was missing We had lost our dear soul mate, it could not be denied Then the lovely old purple clematis became rather neglected And sadly, slowly wilted and died

Matters arising from July's meeting:

Email received introducing the new village police representative, Pauline Cotton, Market Bosworth.

Thank you letter from SG Garden Show for this year's Parish Council donation. Email updating Convent Site proposed zebra crossing – no further comments made by Parish Council.

Confirmation of street lighting part-night lighting to go ahead.

Update on some actions from July's meeting, plus actions for this month: (i) Village Shop: Cllr Ward made enquiries with HBBC whether it could be prevented from being sold for non-retail purposes. This comes under relevant legislation of the Localism Act 201: the procedure for registering a property as an asset of community value, which will apply once the property comes up for sale. This puts a moratorium of six weeks on the sale of the property to give the community the time to decide if it wants to bid for the property. If the community expresses an interest the moratorium is extended to six months to allow the bid to be actioned. An application for a property to become an asset of community value can only be put forward by a community group such as the parish council, not by an individual.

(ii) Church Walks - Clerk has requested Groundsman to cut back.

(iii) Litter Bin – not secure and unusable, Clerk has requested Grounds-man to rectify.

(iv) Three ditch quotes received – Councillors to inspect area.

(v) Conservation Area Exhibition to be held on 10 September at Methodist Hall.(vi) SmartWater Kits – now on sale in Post Office. SmartWater village entrance

sign details and costs to be obtained.

20mph Limit

Councillors discussed at length the Streets 4 All Group's proposal of a 20mph speed limit within the village. The majority felt it would be unrealistic to implement this limit through the village. A motion was put forward by the Chairman. *Motion:* 'The Parish Council notes the concerns of the residents in relation to traffic speed in the village and acknowledges that there is strong support for 20 mph village wide speed limits. Accordingly the Parish Council pledges its support for implementation of 20 mph limits, subject to a full consultation showing majority public support for any proposed implementation.'

Proposed: The motion was proposed by Cllr Fisher.

Resolved: It was resolved by the Parish Council as not acceptable and would write to the Street 4 All Group with its reasons as follows:

This was brought to Stoke Golding Parish Council meeting and it confirms that your request has been noted, but unfortunately there was no support for it at Parish Council. The reasons for the decision are that the Council felt the money would not be available for the scheme and believed, because of the lack of finance and the lack of police enforcement, the scheme therefore would be difficult to implement.

Defibrillator proposal

A letter has been received from Margaret Collier requesting support of the Parish Council for funds towards a defibrillator for the village. Councillors supported this initiative with the proviso that the Parish Council would welcome match funding from others and that people be trained to use this equipment.
