Joy - England Team Ladies Champion



England International skeet shooting champion, Joy Hirons of Stoke Golding, has had an amazing year with yet more successes over the summer. She had a brilliant debut for the England shooting team at the Home International in the Republic of Ireland. Less than a week after retaining her British Open title Joy travelled over to County Donegal with the 19 strong team in order to take part in the tournament. The first day consisted of shooting at 100 clay targets and the second day 50 targets. Joy hit 97 on the first day and all 50 on the second giving her a total of 147 out of

150. That score left her as tournament ladies champion, England team ladies champion, and member of the winning ladies team. It also left her as 4th overall highest scorer in the whole England team, a truly dream debut.

Joy became British Open Ladies skeet champion for a second year running, hitting 99 of her 100 targets in a championship which took place at Dartford in Kent in ever worsening weather conditions.

Joy will now train even harder through the winter, with her coach Dave Beardsmore, at Doveridge shooting ground in Derbyshire in preparation for next year.

A RICHMOND MEMORIAL AT STOKE GOLDING.

To the Editor.

Sir, -- As the worthy Mayor of Leicester was unsuccessful in the attempt to induce the authorities to hold the Easter review on the ever-memorable Bosworth battle field (Redmoor Plain), it would be a laudable object to attempt to raise funds to erect a suitable monument to commemorate the battle and the crowning of Richmond on the battle field. It appears strange to me that a monument (even such as it is) should be placed at the foot of Ambeau Hill to the memory of cruel Richard III., and nothing raised on the "Crown Hill" at Stoke Golding to the memory of Richmond, who, as the historian says, "if not the best monarch, was the most useful that ever sat upon the English Throne." "He restored," continues the historian, "a nation of tumult to civil subordination, an insolent and factious aristocracy humbled, wise laws enacted, commerce restored, and the peaceful arts made amiable to a people for whom war alone heretofore had charms." A monarch who did all this for the nation deserves to have a monument raised to his memory on the spot where he was crowned. - Hoping some one abler will take the matter in hand, I am, sir, yours, etc., RUSTIC. Stoke Golding, March 16.

What Happened to 'Power to the People'?

Having a say over what happens in our own communities sadly seems to be a thing of the past. Many people I spoke to about the latest development proposals from Morris Homes to build 75 houses at the end of Sherwood Road guessed the decision even before permission was granted. We have recently witnessed the erection of a solar panel farm in Stoke Golding, built despite an overwhelming majority of villagers against it, HBBC voting against it and fierce opposition from MP David Tredinnick and County Councillor Ivan Ould.

Stoke Golding Parish Council is now lobbying David Tredinnick to ask the Secretary of State to call in the decision to allow the Morris Homes development and has written to all Parish Councils, warning them that unwelcome developments could also be forced upon their own villages and to ask for their support. Here is an excerpt from their letter:

14/00262/OUT Morris Homes Development-Hinckley Road, Stoke Golding.

The Planning Committee's decision on August 19th, granted access and delegation to officers to agree details and site layout, without further opportunity for committee members or the community to have any chance to influence this controversial site for 75 dwellings. This has raised understandable concerns in Stoke Golding and the surrounding parishes.

This site was recommended by officers for approval 3 years ago and turned down by committee and subsequently lost at appeal. The site was put forward in the Strategic Housing Land Availability Report (SHLAR), but was discounted due to the site being grade 2 agricultural land. Permission is required from DEFRA to plough land so designated and this is historical ridge and furrow.

The permission granted for this site contravenes nearly all HBBC's own policies and all local policies. How can this be acceptable? Local opinion as voiced by our councillors, groups and individuals is being dismissed as being of no consequence. Do we no longer have a voice?

Is it planning officers' responsibility to suggest ignoring planning policy, because of the urban shortfall? Officers in their appraisal acknowledged the rural requirement had been met in Stoke Golding; building in the village in the years since adoption of the Core Strategy in 2009 far exceeds our key rural village requirement.

We can only hope that the Rt. Hon. Eric Pickles MP will take time to listen to our concerns and use his powers to stop this unwelcome development in our village.

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Dadlington Matters

Sutton Cheney Parish Council Notes re Dadlington. From the Meeting of September 10th at Whitemoors, Shenton

Police Report – PCSO Mike Chapman reported one set of gates stolen, and complaints about lorries speeding through the village.

The letter of objection to the Planning Application for 75 houses in Stoke Golding was sent to HBBC. Despite this plus letters from residents, MP, local councillors etc. the application was upheld. All councillors shared their disappointment. Heritage Street Signs will be installed in Dadlington. It is intended to use the same design as currently installed in Market Bosworth and Shenton. They will be part funded by the Borough Council's Environmental Improvement Programme of 50% towards Heritage nameplates, though it may be that these funds are not available until the new financial year.

The Parish Council received and viewed the photographs of Dadlington from the Webster Collection, kindly given by Jill Webster and funded by the Thomas Barton Trust. It is intended to arrange a showing in the Village Hall so that local residents have an opportunity to assist in identifying and cataloguing.

New batteries will be purchased for the vehicle operated speed sign. Ivan Ould, Borough Councillor, was asked to convey to LCC and the Heritage Services the support of the Parish Council for the activities surrounding the reinternment of the remains of Richard III on March 22nd 2015. We have requested that our Parish, and in particular Dadlington and Sutton Cheney, be included in the processional route that will be taken from The Battlefield Centre to Leicester

From a Dadlington garden

How does anyone become a gardener? New gardeners need knowledge and confidence; knowledge can be learnt but confidence only comes by doing. So, how do you find out what to do, when to do it and how?

Learning from other gardeners is the best way. My dad was my first gardening mentor and when we moved to Dadlington our new neighbour, John Hood, became an additional source of inspiration and advice. Always in his garden, I'd peer over the fence and say "What are you doing, John?" and then I'd consider doing the same. I soon realised that there is more than one way to achieve results as John and Dad often did things differently.

If you don't have a handy role model then there are other ways to learn. Have a browse in a library or bookshop to see what books might suit you. I've always had a small collection of gardening books to refer to and I wouldn't be without my set of Dr Hessayon Expert books. Gardening magazines are a great source of information with interesting articles and handy tips and then there are many websites – try www.rhs.org.uk or www.gardenersworld.com.

For a more structured approach to learning how to garden have a look at the BBC's free online course 'How to be a gardener' at www.bbc.co.uk/gardening/htbg. This excellent resource is now quite old and a few of the pages are no longer active but it covers everything you need to know to get you started.

If you currently don't consider yourself a gardener, spend some time this winter improving your knowledge and begin again next spring with renewed confidence.

BETH'S CORNER

I'd been told by many folk in the village that Bob Mayne, as one of Stoke Golding's longest lived residents would have a store of memories. Having phoned him first, I knew I was going to enjoy our afternoon together. Bob's memory at 94 is amazing. Not only of his life here in the village, but also his vivid stories of wartime in the RAF. His wonderful sense of humour had me laughing so much, I had to keep reminding myself to take notes, or I'd never remember a thing. So, looking up my scribbled notes, and - 'if you're sitting comfortably – let us begin.'

Born in 1920 in one of the cottages next to The Swan, now the car park, he was one of four boys and one sister Jean Schooling began at St.Margaret's, at the old school house opposite the church, and then at The Baxter Hall. 'I got a scholarship and went to Dixie Grammar after that. Took my School Certificate.' Obviously a bright lad from the start, I thought: 'So how did you get your first job Bob?' 'Well I got on my bike and rode around Hinckley asking for employment.' I smiled to myself, imagining his determination at just fifteen. 'East Midlands Electricity Supplies gave me an interview, and then offered me a job in the office, learning everything I could pick up as I went along.' He volunteered for the RAF and had some extraordinary experiences.

After his first base and original months of training, he was then put into a small signal unit, loaded into an army lorry, with no idea where they were being taken. Arriving at Portland Harbour they had their first inkling. 'We had a good idea what was coming next. – Dunkirk'!' Our lads were being sent to support the US. Army, and they made that memorable landing at Omaha Beach. They were also included in all the American Army kitchens. Bob bursts into laughter: 'Oh we struck lucky alright. Our food wasn't a patch on what they were given. We got nasty little tins of dried egg, dried milk – dried everything. Americans' grub was great.' 'We followed behind them through France, Belgium, Holland, Germany and finished up with the Russians – just down the road from Spandau. You know the prison where Rudolph Hess committed suicide.' What a journey. What a war Bob had. I was totally absorbed.

Just over a year ago he lost Elsie, his wife from 1943. They married at St. Margaret's and spent the first couple of years with his parents in Church Walks, but after a couple of homes, bought the house in Station Road, their home ever since. This one folds up so I can take it with me.....I'm longing for a cup of tea- can you make one for us both.' After even more anecdotes, and more laughter I looked at my watch – 'Gracious it's time to go. Thanks Bob for a great afternoon.

BERNICE SHURMER



Parish Council Notes - August 2014

Pauline Goodsell could not attend the meeting, but submitted the following report: Convent Site Community Land - Report to Parish Council

Composting toilet is installed and the Parish Clerk informed for insurance purposes. Gates are stored at Iron Styles. They have been repaired, sand blasted and received an initial protective coat.

Apple tree news: The tree nursery at St Martin's was found to be partially waterlogged so a rescue mission was undertaken by David Riddington, Sue Mitchell, Geoff Ford and David Goodsell. Some trees have been temporarily replanted at 3 Hinckley Road and measures to improve the drainage around others taken. Bea Grimley volunteered to care for the St Margaret's trees during the school summer holiday. During Adult Learners' Week David Goodsell gave a short talk to people taking part in the willow weaving session and a number of people expressed keen interest in joining the project.

On 18th July a meeting of members of the Parish Council Convent Community Land Subcommittee and representatives of Raglan Housing was held at the Village Hall. Main points from the meeting:

- 1. It is important to provide a good quality shed/shelter for the users of the site and to this end Jag Gill will obtain quotes for the work. This may mean that other items will have to be put on hold other grants applied for etc once the ownership of the land is transferred.
- 2. Raglan Housing is keen to hold an event to celebrate the completion of this work and the installation of the composting toilet plus exhibiting the willow sculpture.
- 3. Anne Phillips presented a report from a survey she had conducted with new residents of the Convent Drive development. This was largely very positive and gives some interesting information.
- 4. Raglan Housing will be participating in the Music Festival having generously provided a raffle prize of £250.

Matters arising from July's meeting:

Wicksteed - confirmed that the resistance on the exercise bike is not adjustable. Clerk to request a modification or replacement.

The funding from the Community Initiative Fund and 106 has now been received. It is proposed that the interest from the Women's Hall Charity also be spent on this project. *Netball Ring* - three prices for wall mounted basketball rings, ranging from £35 to £79, have been obtained. All heavy duty for training/sports clubs/schools etc.

Tree at rec - An additional tree had to be felled at the recreation field, as it was deemed unsafe by Harbours.

Cllr Brown reported that a meeting was held between Stoke Golding Parish Council, St Martin's Academy and Sports Clubs on 9th July.

It was proposed that the Parish Council and the school should work together to access funding to improve sports facilities in Stoke Golding. The playing fields at the school and the recreation ground should be co-ordinated under one management team – 'Sport in Stoke Golding'. A meeting of the grants committee has been arranged for September. The future plans for the recreation ground pavilion were discussed. It was agreed that funding should be sought for the renovation of this pavilion, alongside a new pavilion at the school site.

War Memorial/Cemetery Renovation

Ground work has been arranged for the first week in September. The cleaning of the memorial will take place at the end of September. A grant for 50% of the total costs has been secured from the Environmental Improvement Programme. A quotation from Ironcraft to re-instate railings at the front of the cemetery has been received.

To Approve Risk Assessment/Cemetery Scale of Charges

The Cemetery Scale of Charges was altered to show the following circumstance. It was resolved that 'If, at the discretion of Stoke Golding Parish Council, there is a proven long term, continued association of the deceased with the village of Stoke Golding' a 50% discount will be given on stated cemetery fees. The Cemetery Guidelines should be published on the village website and made available to families when buying a plot, at either cemetery.

Trees

Free packs of trees for community projects were discussed. It was suggested that these could be used at the recreation ground, to both screen the view of the solar panel farm and to replace those trees which have been removed. Cllr Mayes requested that the trees to be placed on the edge of the solar panel farm by the landowner might be evergreen to provide a screen all year round.

The Webster Collection

The late Gordon Webster collected many hundreds of photographs of buildings and people in Stoke Golding and Dadlington. The Parish Council has been given a copy of the collection and would like to thank Jill Webster for making her husband's collection available to the community.

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
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
