The match was a tribute to Pete Robertshaw who gave so much to the village of Dadlington.



The 22nd August 2010 is the 525th anniversary of the Battle of Bosworth, 1485. As you may know there has, for many years, been much speculation over the actual site of the battle.

Dr. Peter Foss, who wrote one of the most definitive accounts of the battle in his book `The Field of Redemore` will be at St. James` Church, Dadlington, (where soldiers from the battle are buried) on 21st and 22nd August with a display showing his interpretation of the battle. This includes a photo copy of the Hinckley-Lyre agreement, which is the first time that this has ever been shown in public. Peter will be pleased to meet and to discuss the battle with anyone interested.

From the Police Box Number plates thefts to avoid paying for fuel

Almost 80 motorists have reported number plates being stolen in less than three months in south Leicestershire.

Police believe the majority are being used to cover the thieves' own number plates before they fill up with fuel and drive off without paying. Since the beginning of April, 19 number plates have been reported stolen in Hinckley.



Sergeant Phil Tebbs, South Area intelligence co-ordinator for Leicestershire Constabulary, said: "This has become an increasing problem in recent months, and now makes up the majority of thefts from vehicles. We believe most of them are being used by people who are trying to avoid paying for fuel – they are committing one theft to help them commit another. I would appeal to anyone who sees someone interfering with a car to call us straight away."

Over the same period, there have also been 18 catalytic converters stolen in Hinckley. These are part of the vehicle's exhaust system and have to be cut away from the underside of the vehicle. Most offences have taken place in car parks. Anyone with information about this type of crime should contact Leicestershire Constabulary on 0116 222 2222, or Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111. If you see someone interfering with a vehicle, report it immediately on 999.



Secure your bikes

A local resident has recently had his shed broken into and 3 mountain bikes stolen from it. Do make sure your sheds, garages, bikes etc are securely locked at all times.

Distraction Offences

Reports have been received about a new kind of distraction offence in this area. The circumstances are that whilst loading their shopping into their car, an elderly shopper or couple are approached by someone asking directions to a local place. Sometimes the enquirer is holding a map.

The enquirer will sometimes spread the map over the shoppers' car bonnet. Whilst the shopper's attention is directed to the map and the conversation, an accomplice steals their wallet, or their handbag from inside the car. Be on your guard. If you are approached get into your car as soon as possible, and leave the scene. Report any incidents to the Police.

More Police Matters

Warning after thefts from shoppers in Hinckley supermarket

Police in Hinckley have issued a warning after a series of recent thefts from handbags in supermarkets.

Over the past month, police have received three reports of similar crimes whereby handbags or purses have been stolen from unaware shoppers in Hinckley supermarkets.

On most occasions, it appears that when the elderly victim has left their trolley unattended to take an item from the shelf, their handbag or purse has been stolen. Officers are appealing for shoppers to be extra vigilant and alert in protecting their property.

PC Paul Hickman, from Hinckley local policing unit, said: "We would like to take the opportunity to remind shoppers to never leave a handbag or purse unattended, especially in a supermarket shopping trolley, and be aware of your surroundings. There are some very simple precautions that people can take to reduce the chances of being a victim of crime in the first place. Something like attaching a purse bell small bell to your purse, handbag or shopping bag can deter thieves as the bell will alert the shopper if their purse or bag is moved.

If people just take these small steps of keeping their property safe then we can hopefully prevent these opportunistic crimes from happening.

top of 10 Downing Street, as well as England kit in all shapes and sizes.



For All Those Village Genealogists

I'm sure that all those readers interested in village history will be aware of the book 'Records of Stoke Golding' written in 1942 by Mr W.T. Hall a relative of Rosamond and the late Desmond Hall of Park House. Almost everything ever written about the village is included in his book, a copy of which is in Hinckley Library. What is not generally known is that he also wrote a slimmer volume in 1942 entitled 'Notes for a History of Dadlington', which is also in Hinckley Library and can be taken out on a library ticket. For those interested in reading the history of the two villages they are an invaluable and entertaining record of village life.


In 1930 he typed out all the details of the births, marriages and deaths records from Church Records from 1561 to 1850 which he had bound in a hard backed foolscap sized book. He also made sure that it included a names index which has ensured that those wanting to research their ancestors from the village can do so in minutes instead of the hours or days that it took previously. That book is kept in the hands of the Vicar and Churchwardens of St Margaret's Church. The Reverend Chris Gash, during his time as Stoke's Curate completed Mr Hall's task by bringing the records right up to 2000.

Perhaps today's genealogists do not realise who was actually responsible for the introduction of the records of births, marriages and deaths. It was in fact King Henry VIII. A historian of the time, Charles Wriothesley in his Chronicle of England wrote in 1538: "This yere in the moneth of September, the Lord Thomas Cromwell, Lord privie Seale, Viceregent to the Kinges Highnes sent out certain Injunctions to all bishops and curates throughout this realme, by the authority of the Kinge, that in every parishe church within this realme the curates should provide a book of the Bible in Englishe ...and that every curate shall keep a booke or register, wherein shall be written every weddinge, christninge and buryinge made within the church throughout the whole yere, the same book to remain in a chist with two lockes and two keyes in the same church provided for the same, one key to remain with the curate, and the other with the churchwardens of the same church"

So, that is why we have a Stoke chest and records. Considering there was no post or internet at the time it is little wonder that it took from 1538 to 1560 before the village Clergyman got a grip of the 'new' system and began his records.

God Save Us From This Dreadful Dirge

Just how long must this nation be condemned to suffer having the second worst national anthem in the world? It needs Roget's Thesaurus to come up with enough adjectives to do justice to the sheer awfulness of this doggerel dirge – dreary, dull, monotonous, offensive, irrelevant, misguided and appealing to sentiments of chauvinistic Victorian Empire grandstanding.

The reasons for a change are many and irresistible: firstly, it is supposed to be a British anthem, yet the Scots and Welsh have quietly and pointedly abandoned it some years ago, choosing instead the much more lively, apt and joyful 'Flower of Scotland' and 'Land of our Fathers' respectively. In Northern Ireland 'God Save the Queen' is only to be heard in Orange circles sung by men with bowler hats proudly wearing sashes and regalia echoing the prejudices and injustices of the 17th to the 21st century, while the Catholic majority simply ignore its offensiveness – or throw Molotov cocktails. Hardly, then a symbol of British unity! So England must find its own anthem.

The second reason for ditching this awful tune is that it is wholly inappropriate for an anthem which is supposed to celebrate our love for our country. All other world anthems from 'God Bless America' to 'Australia Fair' do just this while French blood is stirred by the wonderful power of the 'Marseillaise'. And what do we have? An anthem which, almost alone in the world, celebrates the longevity of an old lady, our wish to live in servility, and for her to be 'victorious', presumably to put all other nations in their place. It's a sobering and salutary thought that only one other nation in the world celebrates the wished for immortality of their beloved leader – North Korea – an anthem so ludicrous that it can be placed even below ours. If this isn't enough to make you feel embarrassed, then ask yourself why no-one plays/sings the whole of our anthem – the omitted verses being so offensively chauvinistic that they would cause diplomatic incidents throughout the world.

Now I've got nothing against the Queen herself (God bless her). There are lots of hospitals, parliaments etc to open where 'God Save The Queen' would be appropriate – but not as a country's anthem. Especially when we have ready made words and music which would do the job with some splendour and beauty. What other country could compete with Blake's classic poem 'Jerusalem' which celebrates our country's 'green and pleasant land'. The music makes the hairs stand up on the nape of the neck and is truly inspirational. Other possibilities include 'I vow to thee my country' – all about England and the patriotic love of this land.

Our anthem, 'God Save the Queen' only began life as a desperate attempt by the British Government in Georgian England to try to raise the popularity of a discredited and scandal-touched royal family who were the subject of widespread ridicule and contempt. They did so by hi-jacking a dreary tune which was wandering around some minor middle and eastern European states, and adding some awful flattery in the lyrics which any dictator would have cherished. Time, I think, to throw it back to where it came from.

Stoke Golding Parish Council - May 2010 Meeting

Cllr Ward was elected as **Chairman of the Council** and Cllr Terheege elected as **Vice-Chair.** Cllr Mayes agreed to stand as Planning Officer again. It was agreed that the Clerk take the role of Financial Officer. **Report from Local Leicestershire Police** - PCSO Chapman, based at Market Bosworth, introduced himself giving a brief résumé of his background and work within the area. He confirmed that the police visit Stoke Golding two to three times a week. He can be contacted on 01162 222 222. Voice mail: 6115

County Cllr Ivan Ould's report: A verbal enquiry had been made to LCC Highways Dept over potential vehicle access to the fields at the end of Sherwood Road. The footpath had been completed from the village to the Northern Perimeter Road – this is connected to possible school transport changes.

MarCity - following the circulation of their recent leaflet a suggestion was made to put an article in the Stoker informing residents of another developer who has been investigating the Sherwood Road site.

Hinckley Road Cemetery: A meeting with the flower tub contractor is still to be arranged re improvements to the Memorial Wall area. Positive comments have been received regarding a new name plate on the wall. An update of memorial stones is needed to establish grave work requirements. 'Memorial Safety Policy' – initial letters to grave plot owners regarding headstone safety are to be added to the Policy. Wykin Lane Cemetery and Wild Life Area: Installation of water at Wykin Lane Cemetery – it was decided to try and establish a new contact with Severn Trent to progress this matter further. Insurance cover for Wykin Lane Cemetery pond was discussed. Work is continuing on the Information Board.

Recreation Ground: The swing and climbing apparatus are now installed with grass matting underneath.

The ditch is piped and filled in. Hedging has been planted of native species, not poisonous to horses. Young people have been working on the design for the BMX humps. The gateway has been removed and the fence replaced on the Goldings' boundary

The following items are to be decided upon: Location and maintenance of dog waste and rubbish bins, seats and picnic tables around the perimeter. Possible use of the Women's Hall money to fund some of these items. Requesting the police to include the Recreation Ground on their regular beat. Clarification of litter picking from maintenance contractor needed. Arrangements for drainage work on the football pitch to be established.

Football Club issues: A Sub-Committee of Councillors has been formed - the Clerk to arrange a meeting between the Sub-Committee and Football Club. A mini football pitch had been marked out. The meeting asked if permission had been granted for this and was it being paid for – this will be pursued by the 'liaison' Committee.

Highway Matters had been followed up from previous meeting. The poor finish on the pathway along Stoke Road - the gang was laid off due to cut backs and the work was not fully completed. Higher than normal noise level coming from a farmer's bird scarer – now resolved. 20mph zone lights at St Martin's High School are randomly flashing out of school hours, including Saturdays – to be investigated. The work on the jitty between Hinckley Road and High Street is still outstanding. The drop kerb in High Street is now in the correct place.

New Applications: 22 Crown Hill Close – Ash tree to be removed, 1 lvy Close – Extension and alterations to dwelling, 3 Hall Drive - Erection of one dwelling, land to the rear of.

Permissions granted: Compass Fields Farm, Wykin Lane, change of use from agricultural building to workshop

Matters arising from the Annual Parish Meeting:

Heritage Warden Report - letters to be sent re the state of canal footpath to Barry Whirritty, HBBC Conservation Officer and to British Waterways.

Consideration of alternative venues for Parish Council meetings which will meet the needs of the disabled. Publishing non ratified minutes – it was agreed to publish important points from meetings that needed to be brought to the public's immediate attention

Women's Hall Accounts – the Parish Council confirmed that these funds will be used to support the Recreation Ground project if needed.

Other matters:

Dog Waste Bins: Numerous complaints had been received regarding the lack of regular collections. It was decided to investigate a change of contractor.

The Charity of Thomas Barton is in the process of procuring a new Village Notice Board. The Charity has agreed to pay for two new grit bins. It was suggested that the Parish Council consider putting up lights around the centre of the village at Christmas. The Charity would consider paying towards the cost. It had been noticed that the old mini goal posts are no longer in the Recreation Ground -the Charity asked if the Parish Council would consider replacing this amenity. The Council decided that the football wall was a satisfactory replacement for the goal posts. It was decided to apply to the Charity regarding other requirements for the Recreation Ground such as seats and picnic tables.
