Solar Panels Update



This is a follow up to the March Stoker article regarding the installation
 of our solar panels – which we are very pleased with. So – so far, so
 good! From the beginning of February until today (8th August) we have
 generated 1479 Kilowatt hours (Kwh) of electricity. This will have

earned us approximately £635 from the FIT – Feed in Tariff - plus £22 calculated at 3 pence per Kwh on half of the units which 'they' estimate we might export. In addition some of our electricity that we have used is free. This is more difficult to report accurately as our old fashioned electricity meter has been going backwards and we have had to have a new one fitted – free of charge. It is illegal to have your meter running backwards so it had to be changed. As it re-started on zero we will need to negotiate with our electricity supplier as to where it should be set.

Current figures show an average generation of 7.83 Kwh per day and average usage during non Economy 7 hours as 3.78 Kwh. So we are making approximately half of the electricity we use during generating hours. Therefore we calculate the return on our investment to be around 5% at the moment and that we are well on track to achieve the target figure of 7% annually that we hope for.

Points which may be of interest if you are considering installation:

- To get best value you need to use as much electricity during generating hours as possible during the longest days we started making electricity by 7.00 a.m. and up until around 7.00 p.m. but obviously that drops according to day length, height of the sun and the actual cloud cover.
- Panels are being improved all the time bit like computers you are never up to date with the latest technology. Also the better the efficiency rating of the panels you put up the more electricity can be generated.
- Some appliances, e.g. a kettle, use electricity very quickly so at that moment of boiling water very quickly it is unlikely that your panels can supply all the current needed. However with something like an immersion heater I would think that once the water is up to temperature the solar panels would keep it topped up nicely. Also washing machines etc. have little spurts of using electricity then they have a rest so it's very difficult to know how much of the electricity that you are making needs to be supplemented by the grid at any given time.

To date 5 houses in Stoke Golding have installed panels and we know of some more that have been ordered and will be fitted soon. There have been several 'guided tours' of our installation and queries from interested residents continue on a regular basis. Mans best friend?







Message from the Rector at St Margaret's Church

Jesus told many parables - stories which are easy to remember and which challenge us to think about life.

I recently heard a modern story or parable that made me think about my priorities in life:

A teacher stood in front of her class ready to conduct a lesson.

She took a large glass jar and placed it on the bench. She began to fill the jar with rocks and then asked the children if the jar was full, to which they replied 'yes'. Next she brought out a handful of small pebbles and filled the jar with them. Again she asked the class if the jar was full and the class nodded in agreement. It was clear to the children that it was full.

Then she pulled out a third container full of sand. As she poured the sand into the glass jar the children were amazed to see how much more could be fitted into it. And before they had a chance to say anything, the teacher pulled out yet another container filled with water, and the liquid was poured between the rocks, the pebbles and the sand.

The teacher looked up to see a class full of quizzical and amazed looks on the children's faces. She asked them what they had learned. After thinking for a minute or two, a child gave the answer. 'If you didn't put the big rocks in first you wouldn't have been able to fit anything else in. So the lesson is to put the big rocks in first.'

Often I find I am filling my jar with many small things and leave no room for the big rocks. Of course it's important to try to get a balance in our lives, and many of the small things are things that need to be done – but it all means very little if I leave no room for the biggest and most important rock in my jar... time with God.

If I start with the rocks of my faith, along with love and care for others, then I'll find there's plenty of time, energy and space in my life for everything else.

How do you fill up your life? What is it that matters most to you? Has this little story given you something to think about?

More Police News

There have been some recent reports of car number plate cloning fraud. This is where criminals will fit a car with a 'clone' of your number plate so that if their car is involved in an accident or an offence such as speeding, your car ends up 'taking the blame' for the incident. This could result in heavy financial losses or even criminal charges. You can read more here at the This Is Money website: <u>http://bit.ly/kYFSgC</u>

Drivers who have number plates stolen or cloned should report the crime immediately to the police. Those who receive unexplained speeding or parking tickets should contact the issuing authority promptly.

Drivers who fall victim more than once should ask the Driver and Vehicle Licensing Agency if they can re-register their car with a new number.

Property Reunited - Police Launch New Site to Reunite Owners with Their Property



Bikes, televisions, jewellery, power tools, gardening equipment... the list goes on. Every year tens of thousands of items are handed in at police stations and recovered as part of day-to-day policing. Police in Leicestershire are now using 'Flickr' an online photo sharing website to reunite

owners with lost, found and recovered property in what is the first website of its kind in the UK.

Detective Inspector Paul Wenlock, Head of the Leicestershire Police Economic Crime Unit, said: 'We recover tens of thousands of items each year, and in cases where the owners of the property are not known, we investigate to identify the rightful owner, reuniting people with their property which can often have sentimental value. We're giving everyone the opportunity to be reunited with their property,' added DI Wenlock.

By law, items can be held by police for up to twelve months; if items have been evidence as part of an on-going court case, police can hold them for up to four years. At the end of the twelve month period, Leicestershire police now give the public an additional 28 days to claim back items found.

DI Wenlock said, 'All we require is a crime number, a brief description of what the item is, any identifying marks, UV pen or SmartWater markings and we will reunite you with your property.'

Traditionally, unclaimed lost, found and recovered property had always been auctioned off at auction houses across the county with the proceeds being reinvested in policing and donated to local charity projects. Police are now using an online eBay page, to replace traditional auction houses, providing further opportunity for the property to be claimed.

'Sadly, due to the cost of storage and warehousing, we can't store items forever. We have to dispose of the items by sending them to be recycled or the auctioned on the eBay Leicestershire Police Property site.' DI Wenlock concluded.

The proceeds from eBay sales of lost, found, stolen and 'other than stolen items' will be equally divided between charitable donation causes chosen by the Force and funding the fight against crime.

In cases where property is auctioned on the eBay site, owners have up until the final funds are received for the goods, to claim them back. People can claim their property by contacting Nick Ayres or Dave Hargrave at Leicestershire Police on 0116 222 2222 ext 5266 or 5175.


Beryl Mary Powers

Stoke Golding Parish Council Meetings

June Meeting

Windrow Compost site - A new planning application has been received at County Hall on the old airfield site adjacent to the MIRA track. Seven Parish Councils in the area have been warned of this new attempt.

MarCity - Representatives of MarCity had met with HBBC and everything on track for committee on 21 June. Substitution of house type was discussed and clarified. MarCity was liaising on a separate issue of the level of affordable housing with possible higher level of shared properties. Legal agreements to be drawn up for access to allotments, with hard standing for car parking, and drainage and fencing to be replaced. Public roads will be adopted except play space; Mar City was asked to investigate the status of the roads between play areas. They are seeking to thin out the wooded area and around the allotment perimeter. Future responsibility of allotments debated, but the Parish Council would need to make an assessment for taking this on and an allotment system would need to be formalised. Mar City to forward details of the level of contribution for bus stops, bus passes and the open space area. Further meetings offered to the council concerning timescales of this development, and the vehicle movements to be considered with regard to the safety of the children.

Dog bins -11 new locks fitted.

Village Hall - Management Committee bid to the Centre Stage programme and were given four shows..

Planning Application Matters

New:

Land rear of 30-42 Hinckley Road – 3 dwellings. Concerns were expressed on (a) the drainage connection (b) new development will not propose any objections or restrict any projects to the Play Area and (c) the building backing onto the play area - its windows may overlook the children's play area.

St Martins High School - mobile classroom.

Old airfield site, Fenn Lanes - Windrow Compost site.

A dog fouling sign proposed for the wildlife area at the Wykin Lane new cemetery to be sourced saying 'Clean it Up'.

Stoke Golding Garden Show 3rd September 2011 – Parish Council donating £30.

July Meeting

Overgrown tree, 15 Hinckley Road – a report was given re overhanging vegetation along the jitty (between Hinckley Road and High Street) and how public safety was at risk. A meeting with Highways to be arranged.

Primary Care Trust – Stoke Golding is deemed Rural therefore doctor's surgery will remain.

Monthly Crime Report - 4 incidents of Anti Social Behaviour of an off road motorcycle, 1 theft, 1 assault.

St Margaret's Road parking - a suggestion of possibly using the recreation ground car park to manage the problem of parking issues in St Margaret's Road was

considered an inappropriate solution as the car park is used regularly by village hall and recreation ground users.

Young Children's Play Area – (a) recommendation for solving the collection of water at the bottom of the multi-play slide and (b) prices for proposed self-closing gates were discussed. It was proposed by the Parish Council that the maintenance gate be refurbished, two pedestrian gates be closed off and one new self-closing gate installed.

Horse Chestnut Tree – After carrying out work on the horse chestnut tree, tree surgeons confirmed it to have bleeding canker on all its branches, together with leaf minor disease. The centre of the tree would die over a period of 1-2 years and its life expectancy was short. The Parish Council agreed it should be made safe and would seek a replacement.

Land rear of Convent Site development - Subcommittee reported on the allotment, woodland and orchard areas situated behind the Convent Site development and the work needed to clear this area, use and develop the site, and possible setting up an allotment society. It was proposed the subcommittee meet with the allotment people to draw up an outline plan to put to the Parish Council, and to liaise with the new project manager of Mar City as soon as possible, especially over the balancing pond and water installation.

Planning Application Matters

New:

95 Hinckley Road – extension and alterations to dwelling. Higham Parish – change of use from residential caravan site with 2 caravans for one gypsy family, to allow 8 caravans. Compost Site, Fenn Lane.

Permissions: St Martins Convent - erection of 59 dwellings.

Conservation Management Plan for the Battle of Bosworth Area. A résumé was given on the first stage of the above and members will be kept up to date of any further meetings.

Bus stop request/proposal - Elderly residents from Andrews Close have asked for a bus stop nearer their junction with Station Road. It is thought that the buses might 'stop on demand'. Clerk to check with the bus company.

Queen's Diamond Jubilee 2012 - Sunday 3 June – an initial proposal to hold a street party to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee 2012 was put forward for consideration.

Stoker Magazine - The Stoker Production Team is looking to be independent of the Parish Council by paying for its own insurance and will obtain quotes.

Information Sheet - It was suggested that an information sheet (as per the wildlife board) be produced, which people could carry with them when walking the cemetery path. These could be available in village shops.
